7:00 PM Call Public Session to Order in Open Session

areas of the community and the amenities that it affords. Bourne embraces excellent education, and offers to citizens a healthy, active lifestyle.

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Andy Driscoll of Inebri-Art said that his company specializes in presenting events, and they are going to be launching the Buzzards Bay Farmer's Market. He said that he would like to invite the Select Board and everyone that is at the meeting to the market. He said that the Farmer's Market will start April 5th and will happen every Wednesday from Noon to 7 PM., until September, and will be held at the Buzzards Bay Park.

6. Select Board's Business

a. Senator Markey, Congressman William Keating, State Senator Susan Moran, State Representative David Vieira, State Representative Steven Xiarhos, Sheriff Buckley, and District Attorney Galibois are invited guests to the meeting. Our Federal, State and County delegation will report on pertinent issues to the community.

Chair Meier said that this is the yearly legislative delegation. He asked all the officials to introduce themselves and said that they would start the presentations with State Senator Susan Moran.

State Senator Susan Moran started her presentation by talking about housing. She said that she and her staff have been contacting the Towns to see what they need the most regarding needs for housing. She said that they have filed an act to increase affordable housing by adjusting requirements for affordable housing eligibility to include the deduction of family income for any money spent on student loans or childcare. She said there is another bill supporting work force, which would establish a tax credit cap up to \$10,000. for affordable housing contractors to be able to deduct payments to their workers. She said there is a similar bill for seasonal work force and there is a bill to be able to protect affordable housing stock, and if voted it would grant a tax on revenue generated on short term rentals that would put money back into each Town's affordable housing trust fund.

Ms. Moran then talked about the Title 5 compliance issue with the technology and timing issues. She also talked about Chapter 90 and a meeting that she attended earlier in which many communities were asking for an increase in funding from the Transportation Committee. She next talked about the bridges and said that she has seen many representatives from Bourne reaching out to Boston and she said that the communication needs to continue. She said that the replacement of the bridges is recognized at the Statehouse. She said that the cost to replace the 2 bridges and the road work will most likely be over 4 billion dollars. She said that this past

January, Federal DOT awarded 1.6 million in a bridge planning grant to the Army Corps of Engineers. She said that MassDOT has spent 25 million dollars in state funds on the project including the canal transportation study, the field service, mapping, pilot borings and geophysical explorations, traffic data collection, environmental coordination, and conceptual engineering.

Ms. Moran ended her presentation by talking about remote meetings. She said that Senate Legislation will be taken up later this week that allows towns to continue remote meetings until March 31st, 2025.

State Representative David Vieira said that regarding the bridges that the State had initially put the money in a bond bill for the approaches and the work that is required from the Commonwealth to get people to the bridges. Mr. Vieira said that Bourne needs to be included every step of the way. Mr. Vieira also talked briefly about the Bourne Rail Trail and about the Cape Cod Chamber of Commerce building. He also talked about the fact that local aid is down a bit, but the two appropriated line items that have been proposed by the Healy Administration, and are before the legislation now, are Chapter 70 and Discretionary Local Aid.

State Representative Steven Xiarhos started his presentation saying that it means a lot to him that at the start of Bourne's Select Board meetings there is a moment of silence to recognize out troops and public safety personnel. Mr. Xiarhos said he is a gold star father, a former police officer, and the father of a police officer. Mr. Xiarhos talked about the many committees that he is on and some of the bills that he is involved with. He said that there is an act to create a municipal and public safety building authority and there is another bill for pesticides.

Mike Jackman, District Director for Congressman William Keating, said he mainly wanted to talk about the bridges. He said that from Congressman Keating's perspective that it is the most important infrastructure project in Massachusetts that we will see in this generation. He said that it is very important that Bourne be fully involved in communications of this project. Mr. Jackman talked about funding sources at the federal level. Mr. Jackman also said that the Cape Cod Regional Transit Authority were able to use ARPA funds to move along the Bourne Rail Trail project.

Nikko Mendoza, State Director, Senator Elizabeth Warren, said that Senators Warren and Markey and Congressman Keating are pushing forward with advocating for federal funding for the Cape Cod Canal bridges, and want to make sure that Bourne is fully engaged throughout the whole process. Ms. Mendoza talked about the funding and grant processes and the bipartisan Infrastructure Law. She said that they are, as a delegation, committed to the implementation of not only the Infrastructure Law, but also the Inflation Reduction Act. She said that with this law and act there would be strong funding opportunities that they strongly encourage municipalities to go after.

Ms. Medoza said that a particular priority for Senator Warren is her Childcare for Every Community Act. She said that childcare is infrastructure, and it needs to be more accessible for everybody.

Jim Cantwell, State Director for Senator Ed Markey, spoke about the CARES Act and ARPA funding that Massachusetts has received and about the Bipartisan Infrastructure Bill. Mr. Cantwell read aloud a statement from Senator Markey regarding the bridges. The message from Senator Markey and Mr. Cantwell was to not despair and that there are more rounds of funding possibilities coming for the bridges. Mr. Cantwell said that there will be another meeting regarding the bridges with MassDOT, the Town of Bourne, the Army Corps of Engineers and all from the Massachusetts delegation.

Mark Forest, Chairman of the County Board of Commissioners, said that he is also on the Select Board in Yarmouth and he is also the Chairman of the Cape Cod Conservation District. He said that the Cape Cod Conservation District's job is to bring federal dollars to Cape Cod for coastal restoration initiatives and in order to do that, they work closely with the offices of Congressman Keating, Senator Warren and Senator Markey. Mr. Forest said that last year they brough 42 million dollars of federal money to Cape Cod to do projects in virtually every community.

Mr. Forest said that he works with Judith Froman on the Metropolitan Planning Organization, which is an organization that makes decisions on where to spend transportation dollars. He said that Ms. Froman does a wonderful job representing Bourne at their meetings. He also talked about some of the important initiatives that the County has developed and about the septic test center that is run by the County at Joint Base Cape Cod. He said that the County has also worked with the Army Corps of Engineers regarding dredging.

Sheriff Donna Buckley gave an update on what is happening in the Sheriff's office currently. She said that they are assessing the challenges that they are facing concerning the Barnstable County Jail. She said that all of the jails in Massachusetts are dealing with mental illness, addiction and domestic violence crime. She said that they now have a recovery program coordinator in place in the jail. She talked about her plans while serving as Sheriff.

John York thanked all the delegates for coming to Bourne. He then talked about the money and the communication regarding the bridges. Phil Goddard also thanked the delegation for being at the meeting. Mr. Goddard said regarding the bridges, that they have an opportunity to be more than just infrastructure and there is a cultural aspect that could be incorporated into the planning for education. There was more discussion about the bridges and the process to get them designed and built and about the responses from MassDOT.

Kathy Fox Alfano said that she wanted to hear from the Federal delegates about the possibility of Holtec dumping radioactive waste into the Cape Cod Bay. Mr. Cantwell said that Senator Markey is the Chairman of the committee that oversees nuclear power, and they had a hearing with the staffs of Congressman Keating and Senator Warren, and State Senator Susan Moran testified at the hearing. Mr. Cantwell said that Senator Markey is against any disposal of the waste. He said that there are four options to get rid of the waste and they are: leave it there to decompose overtime, truck it away, allow it to evaporate, and the fourth is to dump it into the bay. He said that at the hearing, the president of Holtec said, under oath, that there would not be a discharge into the ocean unless all of our stewards and participants were in accord. He said that all 3 of these offices have been working very cooperatively and have weighed in very strongly against Holtec dumping the waste into the bay.

Chair Peter Meier asked the delegates to consider making the area around Upper Cape Tech safer while designing the alterations due to the bridge construction due to the accidents and near accidents that happen in that area.

b. Update on the Bourne Rail Trail and presentation of a Resolution by the Advisory Committee.

David McPherson introduced himself as the Chairman of the Pedestrian Bicycle Pathway Advisory Committee, which is a committee that is appointed and reports to the Town Administrator. He said that the committee has been at work since 2018 to locate funding for design and construction of the proposed Bourne Rail Trail that would link the Cape Cod Canal to the pathway in Falmouth. He said that have had a lot of success for funding for design work through Mass Trails grants and Community Preservation funding at the Town level.

Mr. McPherson said that design work has been done on 3 of the 4 phases of the project. He said the two major issues that they have found over the years are competition for construction funding and trying to design a pathway such that is could be built along the existing rail line. He said there is opportunity for substantial funding for this project through federal stimulus dollars that have been secured by the Cape Cod Regional Transit Authority.

Tom Cahir, Cape Cod Regional Transit Authority Administrator, said that he has watched this process of the Rail Trail for many years and he knows about the challenges as he has worked on similar projects over the years. He explained how the area receives federal funds. He approached the FDA and asked if it would make some sense to help participate financially to help expedite the Rail Trail and the FDA said they encourage bike and pedestrian facilities to be helped by transit authorities if they are near bus stops.

Mr. McPherson talked about fencing and the opposition of the fence. Mary Jane Mastrangelo talked about the idea of rail with trail, and the opposition of it, and about rail to trail. She said that she is totally in support of looking at the options of making this work.

Voted: Judith Froman moved, and Mary Jane Mastrangelo seconded the following resolution: Whereas the Town of Bourne recognizes the many aesthetic, economic, safety and social advantages to both its citizens and the broader community of Cape Cod and beyond of having a Rail to Trail pathway dedicated to bicycle and pedestrian use and whereas the Cape Cod Regional Transit Authority has secured federal stimulus funding for the construction of such a Rail to Trail pathway now therefore be it resolved that the Select Board of the Town of Bourne hereby endorses and approves the effort to create a Rail to Trail bicycle and pedestrian pathway in place of the so called Falmouth secondary Rail Line and respectfully requests that the honorable Maura Healey, Governor of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, take all appropriate measures to ensure construction of said Rail to Trail pathway as expeditiously as possible utilizing federal stimulus funding provided by the Cape Cod Regional Transit Authority.

Stephanie Fitch, Conservation Agent, said that the Conservation Commission is a well-balanced Commission, and they represent all the residents and all of their viewpoints

Voted: Melissa Ferretti moved, and Mary Jane Mastrangelo seconded to appoint Mr. Dave Wilson as a Special Police Officer with a term ending on June 30th, 2024. **Vote:** 4-0-0.

8. Discussion and possible – process and instrument to be used for the annual evaluation of the Town Administrator.

Chair Meier said that instruments and forms have been given to all on the Select Board from various sources, and he wanted to know if everyone had a chance to look them over and their thoughts on them. Ms. Froman said that she prefers the one that is from the Town of Westborough, although she thought that the part that says the Assistant Town Manager will solicit and summarize inputs from departments, should be H.R. instead. Ms. Mastrangelo said that the template that Chair Meier had sent out was ok, aside from some duplicates. She also said that she thinks the negotiations between the Select Board and the Town Administrator on the instrument used to evaluate the Town Administrator need to be done in executive session.

It was decided that they will meet in executive session next Tuesday evening at 6:15 PM. Melissa Ferretti added that she thought that some of the information that they were given had too much in them and some not enough. She also said that she agrees that they should have the discussion with Ms.

McCollem in executive session. She also agreed with Ms. Froman about the template from Westborough.

9. Town Administrator report -

Ms. McCollem wanted to remind everyone that maintenance is scheduled to start on the Sagamore Bridge starting on Monday, with lane restrictions, and will continue until Memorial Day.

She also said that regarding the Governor's budget, Bourne did get the preliminary cherry sheets and it did result in the local budget having a \$50,000. shortfall for the proposed year, FY24. She said that they were waiting for the schools' budgets and got confirmation from Upper Cape Tech that they are \$112,000. short from the estimate that she was holding in the proposed budget. She said that she and the Town Accountant and the Finance Director are working on a plan and will get back to the Select Board on the 28th with adjustments, after showing the adjustments to the Finance Committee on the 20th. She feels that these shortfalls can be managed without any cuts.

Town Administrator's Advisory Committee on Pedestrian Bicycle Pathway Five Year Summary

2023 Executive Summary

The Town Administrator's Advisory Committee on Pedestrian Bikeway Pathway (PBPC) is transmitting this first report of findings since inception and elaborating on plans going forward with respect to the proposed Bourne Rail Trail (BRT).

The PBPC has focused on a Rail *with* Trail design working in four phases. It was thought that the phased approach would help to contain the scope and costs while enabling us to begin with the "easier" phases at the endpoints while postponing on the more difficult challenges presented by the two longer, more restricted middle phases. The Phase 1 plan envisions construction of the BRT from the Cape Cod Canal Pathway a half mile into Gray Gables. The Phase 4 plan extends Falmouth's Shining Sea Bikeway from the town line one mile into Cataumet. Design work was contracted out. MassDOT controlled requirements. To date, Phases 1, 2 and 4 have been assigned project numbers by MassDOT, a 75% design of Phase 1 has been submitted, and a 25% design of Phase 4 is in progress.

During open meeting and particularly through presentations to the public, the PBPC gained much insight from comments and suggestions. People are extremely supportive of a path. There have been many questions about the physical and environmental challenges, the high financial costs, and the logic for accommodating the rail interests by building the BRT as a rail *with* trail pathway. The alternative, of course, would be to remove the rail and use the railbed for the BRT.

In 2017, the Cape Cod Commission studied the feasibility of the BRT and issued its report that estimated approximately three times the cost for a rail *with* trail than a rail *to* trail project. In addition, it was determined that a rail *with* trail pathway would take significantly longer to build, given areas of narrow railway right of way, probable takings needed, and the numerous environmental approvals that would be necessary for construction of new bridges and walkways. Nonetheless, based on the military's assertion of need for the Falmouth Secondary rail line, and the current uses (dinner train and construction and demolition train) the PBPC planned for a rail *with* trail pathway.

Given the significant challenges of this approach, going forward, the PBPC will take a hard look at the arguments for retaining the existing rail, alternative solutions for rail service, and the relevant public costs and benefits of retaining the rail line for the interested parties vs. removing it to facilitate quicker and less expensive construction of the BRT.

We can report that a path remains highly desired, although there are significant numbers of people who have shared their conviction that a rail *with* trail project will never come to fruition. Citizens are knowledgeable of the favorable outcome of trail projects elsewhere. Bourne citizens want Bourne to be part of the experience. "Vision 88" is something Bourne sees and wants.

The PBPC greatly appreciates Town Engineer Tim Lydon's generous and extremely capable assistance. The PBPC welcomes further guidance from the Town Administrator and the Select Board.

Charge

Town Administrator's Advisory Committee on Pedestrian Bicycle Pathway

In acknowledging the importance of the creation and expansion of the pedestrian bicycle pathway between the Town of Falmouth and the Town of Bourne, the Town Administrator hereby establishes an Advisory Committee on Pedestrian and Bicycle Pathways in Bourne.

The Charge of the Committee is to assist in the creation of a pedestrian and bicycle pathway within the geographic boundaries of the Town of Bourne, connecting with the Shining Sea pathway in Falmouth and extending to the Bell Road area of Bourne Village. The Committee will work along and in conjunction with local, regional, state and federal agencies; establish and/or expand safe routes to school; determine Right of Way related issues - propose solutions to mitigate impediments for the establishment and maintenance of the pathway; seek both governmental and not governmental sources of funding to achieve the construction of the pathway.

The membership of the Advisory Committee shall consist of seven members and shall be constituted as follows;

- 1 Board of Selectmen member
- 1 School Department designee
- 2 At large members

3 – Members of existing groups currently engaged in the planning of the pathway.

The Town Administrator shall serve as an ex-officio member of the Committee. Employees of the Town of Bourne may be called from time to time to provide topical and technical expertise as the need may arise.

Expanding the Search Area in 2023

We have focused on getting pieces of a bike path. We have been patient with the pace of bureaucracy. We have been encouraged to consider the reduced cost and greater flow of support that would result from the community in pivoting from exclusively pursuing rail *with* trail to an approach that is data driven, considers all viable options, and is communicated to the public in future presentations. Following this approach will significantly help to calibrate efforts with what the public will ultimately support. We cannot ignore facts. The proposed phase plan for a rail *with* trail project has met resistance. The physical, environmental, and financial challenges associated with building the pathway alongside the railroad tracks are considerable and may be difficult to overcome. Justification for accommodating the rails has been absent. A true cost/benefit analysis has been lacking.

A rail with trail product may not be achievable. One of the benefits of removing the rails is that, properly done, it creates a linear park-like green corridor from which to enjoy the scenic beauty of our town. This simply can't be achieved if hemmed in with a fence next to a track.

The desired path is the missing link in an emerald necklace stretching from Sagamore to Woods Hole. The corridor belongs to the public. It is 65 acres of public property. Bourne residents are primary stakeholders. The end plan must gain resident support and be something all will be proud of. **Members Past and Present**



Peter and Marlene -

I saw in last week's *Enterprise* that the Advisory Committee on Pedestrian Bicycle Pathway had submitted a report on the Bourne Rail Trail (BRT) to the Town. In support of that report, the Committee will appear before the Select Board at its March 7 meeting to seek guidance regarding to the existing tracks on the Falmouth Secondary Rail Line. From the news article, it appears that while the Committee is seeking guidance, it is in favor of the Rail-to-Trail alternative - that is - in favor of removing the existing tracks.

I am very much in favor of the BRT, but am opposed to removing the existing tracks. That approach looks like a short-term expedient that will eliminate some potential long-term opportunities for the town.

Because I will be out of town during the March 7 meeting, I'm sending along some questions and comments for your consideration -

- If we go forward with bike trail funding proposals that are based on a common formula 80% federal (Surface Trans Prog) funds / 20% other sources and the design is predicated on removing tracks deemed by the Department of Defense to be a supporting component of the Strategic Rail Corridor Network (STRACNET), can we assume that the competitiveness of our proposal will not be damaged when USDOT determines that funding this project will be at cross-purposes with a policy goal of the Defense Department?
- •
- The CCC Bikeway Extension Feasibility Study (2017) is a well-written overview document. It is not my intention to slag them on details, but it is not apparent that the cost of removing more than 6 miles of tracks, signals, cross ties and ballast stone has been addressed in the Unit Cost Appendix. The cited project examples did not appear to have a track demolition/disposal component. The cost for demolition, transportation and disposal of that many tons of hazardous materials will be far from insignificant. When this cost component is taken into account, the Cost per Mile spread between Rail with Trail and Rail to Trail will narrow.

- If USDOT refuses to allow federal funds be used for the removal of the Falmouth Secondary Line, what funds should we expect will be used to pay for demolition/disposal? State? local?
- •
- What is the nature of MassDOT's ROW lease agreement with Mass Coastal Railroad? When does the current lease expire? Will the Advisory Committee ask the Select Board to advocate for a termination of that lease agreement? before the BRT project is fully funded?
- •
- If Mass Coastal RR's lease on the Falmouth Secondary ROW is terminated, will that not represent an amputation of a significant "arm" of its business model? Is there any reason to believe the railroad won't bring a lawsuit? Should we expect they will only sue MassDOT? Should the Town set up a reserve fund for potential legal costs?
- Other upper cape towns are currently dependent on the Upper Cape Regional Transfer Station at Joint Base CC to manage their solid waste disposal. Removal of the Falmouth Secondary Line will sink that arrangement. Will those towns be required to build individual transfer stations? Will those towns' disposal rates go up when they are forced to switch to over-the-road hauling? Are those multiple truck trips likely show up on Route 28? Will Bourne one day need the cooperation of those towns in addressing some future project with regional benefits? ... waste water? In an era of increasing inter-municipal cooperation, is there a price to be paid for a go-it-alone approach to projects with regional implications?
- •
- We recognize that aligning the bike trail along the rail corridor offers pleasant views of bays and marshes and a flat route. However, if construction costs appears to be the principal issue associated with the Rail-with-Trail alternative and it appears that the Rail-with-Trail (w/ at grade bridge crossings) alternative is less costly, can we be assured that a thorough and unbiased cost/benefit analysis has been conducted on this second alternative? *Must the perfect be the enemy of the good?*
- •
- A bike trail alignment east of Route 28 might be the least costly route of all, Are there fatal flaws associated with that route? Alternately, if the Committee advocates for the relocation of the railroad tracks east of Rte 28, will the associated costs be part of the funding proposal? Otherwise, it's a non-starter see RR lawsuit above.

Planning for the Future - A Strategic Opportunity Reserve

"It's tough to make predictions - especially about the future." Yogi Berra

In the mid-90's, I was part of a master planning team working to redevelop some nasty industrial uses on the Malden River (Medford) as an office park. In a conversation with a member of the development team, I mentioned a few local characteristics that would likely be part of our approach to the master plan - river edge opportunities, organized spaces / building sites on the spine of a ped. route to nearby Wellington T station. He agreed that those elements had a lot of merit at the land planning level, but his group's strategic focus would be on the marketing program. The target market for these buildings would be (less expensive) back-office space for existing financial and technology companies in downtown Boston/Cambridge. Those companies require dedicated high-speed, high-capacity

communications between various locations and fiber optic cable was then a new technology able to deliver that service. The value of this property lay not in the nearby Orange Line station, but in the directly adjacent Orange Line right of way itself. The rail ROW offered the potential for direct fiber optic cable connection to downtown. There was a considerable competitive advantage in not having to negotiate cable routing agreements with 3-4 municipalities and several utilities. A cable burying agreement within the ROW would only have to be reached with a single entity - the MBTA.

The point of the story?

It gave me an appreciation of how emerging technologies can introduce novel conditions on development decision-making and drive planning strategies in new directions. The rise of the automobile is a perfect example.

Typically, developers and architects work within short 3-5 yr time spans, effective town planning however, works on a 30 yr. time horizon. It recognizes that assuming the future will unfold as a smooth extension of present conditions - a series of modest incremental changes - is hazardous.

Consider that the average Bourne resident in 1900 probably lived in a horse-drawn, earthbound, telephone-less, kerosene-lit world. By 1930, the children of that citizen may have owned a car, had heard of someone trying to build an "air-line" company and experienced living in a rapidly electrifying community. That's disruptive technology that no one could have predicted.

Consider this particular fever dream of one possible future:

- Is it inconceivable that someday the Commonwealth might decide that a part of Joint Base CC is underutilized and develops a master plan to reorganize a part of the base cantonment area? As a result of that process, a substantial but severable area is made available for development of private Blue Economy industries - a smaller, marine-oriented version of Devens - the former Ft. Devens in Ayer.
- •
- To support the development, the state modernizes and expands the base wastewater treatment system. Excess treatment capacity is designed into the new system and DEP proposes an inter-municipal agreement with some surrounding towns to participate in the cost of the project in return for a reserved share of available capacity. Those towns recognize the favorable economies of scale and a deal is struck.
- •
- Available treatment capacity and the influx of new business park employees allows Bourne's south side villages to grow, enhance their cores and increase local retail activity, restaurants and services that are requisites of compact, walkable communities.
- •
- Some entrepreneurial types recognize that a segment of the RE market will pay a premium for property that offers the dream (*and reality*) of genuine village living. That market segment may include some new town residents attracted by the (future) opening of a commuter rail station in Buzzards Bay. The entrepreneurs visualize a business opportunity in the Mass Coastal RR and negotiate an agreement for a coordinated time-share use of the tracks maybe mornings and late days coordinated with that future BB commuter rail train. The RR itself might be that entrepreneur.

• They create a modern version of the old interurban electric trollies of the early 20th Century and develop accessible platforms in each village. The vehicles might be somewhat smaller than shown and battery-powered to eliminate overhead infrastructure. New battery and signal technologies may allow what was once old to become new again.

•

• Beside linking the south side villages together and providing a transit connection to the downtown commuter rail stop on a year-round basis, the 12 mile roundtrip might also become popular with seasonal tourists (*trolley to the beach?*). It might contribute to at least a limited form of car-free living in Bourne.

A more modest mid-term future for the Falmouth Secondary Line might just be a more intensive version of the present condition. It could be driven by siting decisions of several firms' senior management that recognize Bourne's competitive advantages - an opportunity to locate their marine tech headquarters / fabrication facility at the (future) JBCC industrial park, adjacency to MMA and WHOI, the ability to live in pleasant, nearby seaside villages and convenient shipping of large, awkward assemblies by rail to their port operations in New Bedford.

Are these 'futures' politically possible, technically practical, economically viable? who knows.

The solution to an "impossible" problem often seems obvious after someone else has accomplished it. If the tracks are removed however, the question is pointless.

The more relevant question for the Town is - *Do the RR tracks represent an impediment or a strategic asset?*

Real value can reside in potential future roles for existing assets and hyper-local adaptations that can enhance Bourne's character and sense of place. It would be lamentable if a future journalist writes a critical piece on us for pursuing a short-term, adhoc solution that caused a useful option for future Bourne to be closed out.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING TRUST - provides the Town with many tools to create and preserve affordable housing, including the ability to option, lease, purchase, renovate, and lease out or sell real estate.

COMMISSION ON DISABILITIES - cause the integration and participation of people with disabilities; assists municipal officials in ensuring compliance with the ADA and other state/federal laws

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENTS - mission is to sponsor and encourage community events, projects, activities, services, programs, and public improvements which are of mutual interest to the visitors and residents of the Town of Bourne, and, which strengthen the Town by fostering community involvement and spirit. The Committee shall create an application for funding and invite organizations or individuals to submit on events or activities that will benefit the Town of Bourne and its citizens. In no event may a Member present a project

before the Committee. The committee shall provide quarterly reporting to the Board of Selectmen and Town Administrator.

Chair Meier took a point a personal privilege to say that one of the staff member in the Administrative office is home recovering from a procedure and on behalf of the Select Board he wanted to wish her well on her road to recovery. He also said that over the weekend he went to see the Bourne Middle School's production of "The Little Mermaid", and he said that they did a great job and the students seemed like professional actors. Chair Meier said that Pat Nemeth has resigned from the Planning Board, effective last month. There was some discussion on how to move forward filling this seat. i. School Dept.

Jordan Geist, the Director of Business Services with the Bourne Public Schools, said with some ARPA funding that they were able to cross off a few requests that they had made. He said that their first Capital request is to add \$90,000. to the Tech. plan to finish adding technology to the classrooms.

Mr. Geist said that the next request was for a minibus purchase. He said that he had submitted a request prior to getting the latest updated costs and they far exceeded his original request. He said that the Town Administrator and Finance Director were able to add some additional funds so that two minibuses cold be purchased. He said his original request was for \$150,000. Town Administrator McCollem said that her recommendation is for two minibuses for just over \$160,000. Ms. McCollem added that all of the Capital requests on the agenda tonight have been recommended by the Capital Outlay Committee.

Mr. Geist said that the next item is the Bourne Middle School roof. He said that last year the Capital Outlay Committee gave funds for the design phase. He said that they needed to hire an OPM prior to getting the design done, which was an oversight, and he said that this \$50,000. is to secure the OPM. Mary Jane Mastrangelo asked if this would be considered for ESCO, and Ms. McCollem said that they would not need to use an OPM for ESCO, and she really does not consider this being a good project for the ESCO grant because there is not a lot of energy savings.

ii. ISWM

Dan Barrett, General Manager, Integrated Solid Waste Management (ISWM), said that he has a lengthy list of small items this year and all their purchases will be funded out of retained earnings. He said the first is a street sweeper that they picked up from DPW about 8 years ago, has outlived it's useful life, and a replacement will cost \$319,000. and they can get \$8,000. for the trade of the old one, so they are asking for \$311,000. Mr. Barrett said that the second purchase is to replace their small loader.

Mr. Barrett said that they need \$200,000. for phase 9, which is their vertical expansion. Mr. Barrett explained the liners and the work that they are doing in this process.

Mr. Barrett said that they are asking for \$50,000. to replace their survey GPS base station and rover. He said they bought it about 15 to 20 years ago. The equipment is worn out and needs to be updated. He said that they can trade it in for a new one and get a small amount for it.

Mr. Barrett said that the next is to purchase a survey grade drone with data processing package. The cost would be \$8,000. and the first flight pack would be \$12,000. It will be a huge savings for ISWM by doing it themselves rather than sourcing out. He said that other departments will be able to use it also.

The next item that Mr. Barrett is requesting is a 30-kilowatt generator. The last item is for 40 cubic yard containers, and they have 35 in stock, and they are constantly moving around. Ms. McCollem said that there is another Capital item for ISWM, which is for an 8-yard packer

replacement for \$225,000. She said that this needs to show on ISWM's Capital Plan even though the trash trucks are used by DPW.

iii. Shore & Harbor

Chris Southwood, Natural Resources Director said that the Chair of the Shore & Harbor Committee couldn't be at the meeting so he would present their request. He said they have an annual request regarding dredging and pier and ramp maintenance. He said they ask for it annually through the Waterways Improvement Fund, and this year they are asking for an increase of \$25,000. in addition to the annual \$200,000. and this increase is due to an increase in rates and operation costs. There was some discussion on what repairs they have done and what they are looking to do.

iv. DNR

Mr. Southwood said that they would like to replace their 2011, ³/₄ ton Chevy pickup truck. He said that he received a quote of under the asking of \$90,000. He said that they have a plan to rotate vehicles in the department.

v. Police

Police Chief Brandon Esip said that their first request is for body cameras, and he said that this request has gone before Capital twice and been withdrawn each time. He said the request is for \$413,000. for the program and is based on their highest estimate of the 2 products that they are considering. This request would outfit every officer in the department and includes 10 cruiser cameras. He said that this is a five-year price and would be fully warrantied and the Town would own the cameras after the five years. Ms. Mastrangelo asked if there were any grants and Chief Esip said that there is one grant out there, but it does not apply to them in this case, and if new grants come out, he will look at them. There was some discussion on the data that would be recorded through the cameras.

Chief Esip said that the second request is their annual vehicle replacements. This year they need 5 vehicles replaced due to changes in the last few years with requesting less. He said that the Green Communities agreement that the Town has now, requires the Town to have energy efficient police vehicles. The request is for \$389,000. for the 5 vehicles, which includes 1 vehicle for administrative use. He said that they are going to rotate the older vehicles if they can use them, and they will look at trade-ins also or passing on to other departments if able, and maybe be able to sell them as surplus.

Chief Esip said that their last request is for variable message boards. This is for two new signs and upgrades for the existing 4 signs. These signs would be able to collect traffic data also. The cost of this request is for a little over \$67,000.

vi. Town Clerk

Barry Johnson, Town Clerk said his request is for \$150,000. to replace their existing voting equipment. He said that the current equipment is almost 15 years old and does not fit and is not being manufactured anymore so there is no trade in value.

vii. DPW

Shawn Patterson, DPW Director, said that the first item is the Packer that Ms. McCollem mentioned earlier. He said the purchase is for a 2024 IH 4300 Rubbish & Recycling Packer. He said the second request is for a snowplow and sander for a dump truck. Mr. Patterson said that they are going to wait about the intersection of Barlow's Landing and Shore Road to see if they get the funding from the Complete Streets grant.

viii. Engineering

Tim Lydon, Engineering Department, said that before the Board is the Sagamore Beach access ramp improvements which came to them in the Vulnerability Plan. Ms. Mastrangelo asked what the funding would be and Mr. Lydon said that they are going to CPC tomorrow to request it as an Open Space project. Ms. McCollem said that if it's not successful at CPC, then they will use Climate Resiliency. This request is for the construction funding of \$150,000.

ix. Recreation

Krissanne Caron, Recreation Director said that the first request for the Recreation Department is a Community Preservation request of \$185,000. for a total project of \$235,000. to put outdoor fitness equipment at Buzzards Bay Park. This is a campaign through the National Fitness Campaign. She said that they come in and work with a business partner and here that partner is Blue Cross Blue Shield. She said that they will give communities up to a \$50,000. grant to install this equipment.

There was some discussion on a location in the park where this equipment would be installed. She said that this would be a 38×38 -foot area, with a set amount of equipment. There was some discussion about a policy for users for the equipment. There was also some discussion about what side of the canal this equipment gets installed.

Ms. McCollem said that the second project that Ms. Caron will be speaking about is not on the recommended FY24 Capital Budget, and after speaking to the Capital Outlay Committee it did not move forward and if the Select Board would like to put it on the Capital Plan, then they can do so.

Ms. Caron showed a slide presentation for their next request, the Outdoor Recreation Redesign, and their desire to move forward with the engineering phase of this project. She said that they are here today to continue their work towards Bourne's Mission and the Recreation Department objective. She talked about how this project aligns with the goals of the Strategic Plan, and about being guided by the Local Comprehensive Plan and the open Space & Recreation Plan. She

talked about their timeline for this plan. The request with CPC is for \$500,000 for Engineering at this time.

Ms. Caron talked about the staff working group and gave an overview of the current Recreation property. She showed slides of recreation areas that need upgrades and the need to be ADA compliant. She showed results of a survey taken regarding the Recreation Center and the two concepts of the proposed areas. She talked about the project phasing and estimated costs. The estimated cost for phase one is \$500,000., and for phase 2 it is \$8,573,099., and phase 2 costs may vary. She said the funding sources would be Community Preservation Funds and she will be looking into State grants.

Chair Meier said that the adult softball field would be eliminated with this plan and wants to know if there is a plan in place to replace it. Ms. Caron said that it's easier to find locations such as this rather than finding space for items that are in this Outdoor Recreation Design.

Don Pickard of the Capital Outlay Committee said that this is one of the items that the committee did not move forward. He said that the consensus of the Capital Outlay Committee is that the primary Capital project should be the South Side Fire Station. He also said that the schools need funds for a new roof. He said the biggest issue was the 8 million for phase 2 and how it lands with the 5-year plan. He said that it is a great project although there are other projects that are in need more. Ms. Caron emphasized the funding sources that they are looking at and that they are taking a multi-year phased approach to the actual construction of the project.

Chair Meier said that he thinks that further discussions need to be had regarding this proposed project. Ms. Mastrangelo said that the actual funding and the effect that this project would have on CPA is something that has to be considered. She said that she is uncomfortable with the funding, and she does not think that this should go through to Town Meeting at this time. There was some discussion about the maintenance of the courts, and recreation properties and that there is a need for more of a maintenance plan. Judith Froman said that she feels that the timing for this project is not good for right now. Jared MacDonald said that more work needs to be done for each phase, or at least have more of an idea, and the biggest part of this is the security for the new equipment. He said a maintenance plan needs to be in place to keep the equipment safe including video surveillance. Ms. Caron said that they do have 2 approaches, and one of them is to take it piece by piece, and security cameras are included in the project.

Ms. McCollem said that if the Select Board does not want to move forward with this plan for this Town Meeting, then the application will be withdrawn. Chair Meier said that the Select Board has decided to not move forward with this request.

x. Facilities

Ms. McCollem said that there is a request for \$200,000. to do investigation and design into some of the leaking roofs in the Recreation Center, the Town Hall and at Fire Station 3. She said that this request would give the Town the Specs and the Bid Docs to go out to future money requests for construction.

Ms. McCollem said that the second request for Facilities is an HVAC project at the Town Hall that serves Administration and the Department of Natural Resources with one thermostat. The request is for \$40,000. to separate the systems.

Ms. McCollem said that the next request is for the Town Hall fire alarm system, which is unreliable at this time. She said that is needs to be replaced and the cost is \$60,000.

Ms. McCollem also said that they have hired a Head Custodian. She said that they have received a lot of positive feedback regarding this hire. She said that they are requesting \$30,000. for a small cargo van for the Head Custodian to use for travel between buildings.

Ms. McCollem said that she would like to request \$150,000. for a feasibility study for the library to take a long term look at the future of the library. She said that for the last project, the Community Preservation Committee previously funded some money for the library for the cupola, roof, doors and windows and they are moving forward with using that money to repair the cupola and the roof leaks. She said that once they started looking at the windows and doors it became apparent that it is a serious masonry project that would cost at least \$500,000. She said that she is not comfortable making some of the repairs on the library until the long-term plan for the library is done from the feasibility study. She said that she is asking for \$100,000. to stabilize the front wall, to buy some time.

Voted: Mary Jane Mastrangelo moved, and Judith Froman seconded to move the Capital Plan to the Finance Committee.

Vote: Jared MacDonald – yes, Chair Meier – yes, Melissa Ferretti – yes, Mary Jane Mastrangelo – yes, and Judith Froman – yes. 5-0-0.

2.c. Discussion and possible amendments to the FY24 proposed operating budget for the ISWM Enterprise Fund.

Ms. McCollem said there are no amendments to present. Dan Barrett presented, and there was some discussion, about the numbers in the ISWM Enterprise Fund. Mr. Barrett talked about the leachate program.

Voted: Mary Jane Mastrangelo moved, and Judith Froman seconded to move the proposed FY24 operating budget for the ISWM Enterprise Fund to the Finance Committee.

Vote: Jared MacDonald – yes, Chair Meier – yes, Melissa Ferretti – yes, Mary Jane Mastrangelo – yes, and Judith Froman – yes. 5-0-0.

2.d. Discussion and possible amendments to the FY24 proposed General Fund operating budget.

Chair Meier said that the Board all received an email from Marie Oliva requesting portable bathrooms for Buzzards Bay Park in the summer. Chair Meier said that there was an issue with the lack of open bathrooms last summer. There was some discussion about the length of time during the summer season to have these bathrooms. Ms. McCollem said she can put together a budget for the Board regarding the bathrooms and she recommended that the Board put a placeholder of \$7,500. for two ADA portable bathrooms for the summer season in Buzzards ay Park.

Ms. Mastrangelo asked about the position from The Recreation Department being moved to the revolving fund. She does not want any fees increased for any programs to offset this change.

Voted: Mary Jane Mastrangelo moved, and Judith Froman seconded for the adjustments to move forward to the Finance Committee from the Town Administrator recommended budget which are the increase in the Porta Potty line of \$7,500., a net zero adjustment in the Fire Department and a \$4,000. restoral for Elections and Registration, with the notification to the Finance Committee that the Select Board is looking at the DPW line item for parks and ball fields.

Vote: Jared MacDonald – yes, Chair Meier – yes, Melissa Ferretti – yes, Mary Jane Mastrangelo – yes, and Judith Froman – yes. 5-0-0.

2.e. Debrief – public information sessions held on 1/24 & 1/26 by MassDOT for the Bridge Replacement Project.

Chair Meier said that he forwarded an email from Senator Markey's office in which they included a letter that was signed form the Federal Delegation. Chair Meier said that when the legislative delegation is in Bourne on March 7th, he will reference that letter because Bourne was not really highlighted until the second to last paragraph. Ms. Froman said that they need to keep pushing forward that Bourne needs to be part of the conversations. There was some discussion about how much Bourne will have a place at the table in the bridge planning and about tying in Town Counsel to the process.

2.f. Discussion and possible vote – declination of c.61A right of first refusal for 0 Scenic Highway (Assessors Map 16 Parcel 4).

Voted: Judith Froman moved, and Melissa Ferretti seconded to decline to exercise the Town of Bourne's right of first refusal to acquire land currently held in c.61A status shown on the Assessors Map 16 Parcel 4, containing 7.06 acres at 0 Scenic Highway in Bourne.

Vote: Jared MacDonald – yes, Judith Froman – yes, Melissa Ferretti – yes, Mary Jane Mastrangelo – yes, and Chair Meier – yes. 5-0-0.

3. Town Administrator's Report – status update for the Tides of Bourne – update on the Chamber info booth at the Bourne Rotary – upcoming trainings for Boards & Committee by Town Counsel.

Ms. McCollem said that regarding the Tides of Bourne, the Calamar project, they are working cooperatively with the developer, and they have been meeting regularly and progress is being made. She also said that Assistant Town Administrator Liz Hartsgrove will be working with Town Counsel on some trainings for all boards, committees, and commissioners regarding the information booth.

Ms. McCollem also said that the MBTA zoning final action plan was submitted yesterday and there is a version on the Planning Department's website. She also said that she wanted to let the Board know that she will need to talk more with them about NextGrid because of a recent phone call.

Town Administrator Marlene McCollem said that Chief Cody let her know that this a procedure available to the Town based on MGL c.148a, that allows the town to issue citations for violations of the state building and fire code. She said it allows the town to handle serious recurring violations with a written civil warning rather than court action. She said that the town previously had a hearing officer, and that person is no longer serving in this role, and there were no hearings during that person's tenure in this role. She said that Ms. Hartsgrove will have to attend a training and it is only available if the Select Board appoints her as the hearing officer.

7.a. Presentation by the Cape Cod Commercial Fishermen's Alliance.

Doreen Leggett of the Cape Cod Fishermen's Alliance gave a brief outline on who the alliance is. She said that the Cape Cod Commercial Fishermen's Alliance, which is based in Chatham, was started in 1991 by a group of fishermen who were worried the Cape's small boat fleets would disappear if managers didn't start paying more attention to the environment and sustainable fishing. She said that over 30 years later, their belief is much the same and they take their lead from their members. She said they are involved in advocacy, research, education and policy to make sure local fisheries are not only a vital part of the Cape's past and present, but also of the future.

Ms. Leggett talked about a report that provides an overview of commercial fishing in Massachusetts that describes conditions in each municipality with a commercial homeport. She said that her being there is part of an effort by the Cape Cod Commercial Fishermen's Alliance and DMF to visit every town on the Cape that has a commercial port to elevate awareness. She talked about some statistics of commercial fishing on the Cape, and about aquaculture and dredging. She said that the alliance will do letters of support when towns apply for grants.

Melissa Ferretti asked how to become a member of the Cape Cod Commercial Fishermen's Alliance and Ms. Leggett said that although one can apply to become a member, membership is not needed for the alliance to work for the commercial fishermen and act as an advocate. Chris Southwood, Director of Natural Resources for the Town of Bourne, said that the Cape Cod Commercial Fishermen's Alliance is a great advocate for fishermen, and it is needed. Mr. Southwood talked about what the Town of Bourne has done for the commercial fishermen by extending the days and hours for commercial shell fishermen, and expanding the propagation program, and targeting areas that are specific for them.

7.b. Update by George Slade as Bourne's Representative to the Barnstable County Assembly of Delegates.

George Slade gave a brief update on the Barnstable County Assembly of Delegates to the Town of Bourne on the assembly activities. He said that the Assembly of Delegates in conjunction with the County Commissioners administrator and the professional staff work to preserve and enhance the regional services in the County. He said the Assembly is the branch that is responsible for adopting new legislation through ordinances and maintaining the checks and balances over the Executive branch.

He said there are 15 elected members, and they are elected on a nonpartisan basis from each Cape Cod town. He said that they use a weighted voting system based on population of each of the Towns with Barnstable having the most with 21.36%. He said that Bourne has an 8.93 %

vote share. The full assembly meets on the first and third Wednesday of each month and they deal with a variety of issues. He said most of the work is done through subcommittees.

Mr. Slade said that he is presently on the Finance subcommittee and last year they dealt with the approval of the fourth class of the Police Academy. He talked about their budget and the Registry of Deeds. He also talked about dredging projects on the Cape. He also talked briefly about some of the other subcommittees. He said that on the Assembly's website the meetings of the full Assembly can be seen. He handed out some information that he has asked Ms. McCollem to post on the Town of Bourne website about ARPA, and what the Assembly came up with for the towns on the Cape.

7.c. Discussion regarding the communication and feedback to MassDOT for the Bridge Replacement Project.

Ms. Froman said that she does not have any updates at this time. She said that the Select Board has received a lot of communication from John York, a resident in town. Ms. Mastrangelo said that Mr. York talked about getting Town Counsel involved in one of his communications. She said that he has raised an interesting question. She said that the Army Corps of Engineers, by federal legislation, is in charge of the bridges. She said there has now been a memorandum of understanding between the Army Corps of Engineers and MassDOT. She said the question is who authorized the Army Corps of Engineers to enter into this agreement. She said that the Town needs to understand the federal lead, and the authorizations of the structure of how this process is being managed. There was more conversation about involving Town Counsel.

7.d. Discussion and possible amendments to the FY24 operating budget.

i DPW repair & maintenance for fields and courts.

Shawn Patterson, DPW Director, said that he would first like to recognize Matt Karas and Rich Kirkland as two of the people that have taken care of the ball fields for several years in Bourne and that they have done an amazing job. Mr. Patterson said that these gentlemen do not have the time to continue.

Mr. Patterson said that they have reached out to the Voke School and Roger Forget, the Superintendent, has offered to supply some manpower and they will all be putting a plan together sometime in the Spring. He said that this is not a budget or money issue, it is a manpower issue, and he thinks this can solve the issue. Chair Meier suggested that they also reach out to Mass Maritime Academy. There was some discussion about focusing on the school first and about long-term planning for the maintenance of the fields and courts.

Ms. Mastrangelo said that an assessment needs to be done and a master plan needs to be in place. Jim Linsky, a member of the Recreation Committee, said that this has been a topic for the last two years at almost every Recreation Committee meeting. Mr. Linsky said that a little less than two years ago they had a professional assessment evaluation of 6 court locations in the Town done. He said they received an extensive report. He said

that all of these 6 locations were in some form of disrepair, and 2 were so bad that rehabilitation was not possible. He said for the other 4 they went to the CPA and got the funding approved. He said that they have hired an OPM and expect the work to be done this year for a little over \$300,000.

Mr. Linsky also said that about a year ago a representative from the DPW told them that there was zero scheduled or routine maintenance or repair for any of these courts. He said they were told that any repair or maintenance would have to be initiated by any resident using the DPW website to fill out the form request for repair or through email or a phone call. He said that some of the thoughts about this was to create a separate Parks Department or create a separate division within the DPW Department that is just for maintenance of the outdoor areas. There was more discussion about who should be maintaining the outdoor areas. Ms. McCollem said that they are not asking for more funding at this time for the maintenance of fields and are going to see what they can accomplish with the funds that are available.

Matt Karas said he has been volunteering to coach baseball and maintain the baseball fields in Bourne for the past 2 years, since he has been stationed at Joint Base Cape Cod. He said that Bourne is the 7th community that he has lived in for the past 15 years, and he volunteered in every community that he has lived in in those 15 years. He said that Bourne has the worst fields that he has seen in any of those communities. He said that he and another volunteer coach routinely show up 2 to 3 hours before games to take of the fields to make them as safe as possible for the players. There was more discussion that this should continue being a topic of discussion.

7.e. Discussion of potential warrant articles for the May 1, 2023, Town Meeting.

i.

Acceptance of Sanderling & Whimbrel

Ms. Mastrangelo said that these were talked about at a meeting last year and Mr. Patterson said that they should accept these roads. She said that at the meeting they were not given a petition signed by all the people that live on the road that was received by the Town requesting that the Town take ownership. She said that at Town Meeting in 2013, there was \$625,000. appropriated to be borrowed for the repair of private roads. She said the documentation that she has says that there were betterments assessed for around \$460,000. and the residents paid this amount. At that time they wanted the roads to be accepted, and may or may not have submitted the paperwork. She said that she thinks that a process of accepted roads needs to done and she believes that they need to have a warrant article to accept these roads.

Jared MacDonald said that the Town has a certain responsibility to these folks on these roads. He said that a set of standards need to be put together and be a priority. Peter Meier said that there are standards written and they were written in 2017. Mr. Patterson said that the inspection reports were not signed off in the end. There was some discussion about betterments. Miss Froman said that she cannot support this moving forward as it stands right now. She does not feel like the Town is ready and that this is being rushed and put in last minute. She feels that there are a number of other places and streets that have had this conversation and they need to check on those areas that have also followed the rules and this needs to be organized.

Ms. Mastrangelo said she is fine with waiting until the Fall Town Meeting, but she would like the Board to make a commitment to put in the time necessary to have the standards done and the process approved in time for bringing this or any other case before Town Meeting in the Fall. Chair Meier said that the Planning Board needs to be brought in also.

Voted: Mary Jane Mastrangelo moved, and Jared MacDonald seconded that the Board of Selectmen commit to working on the process of accepting private roads and to have a draft process ready by August so that they can be ready for the Fall Town Meeting.

Ms. From a sked the question of whether this is a realistic goal. Ms. Mastrangelo said she said a draft. There was no more discussion on this topic.

Vote: Jared MacDonald – yes, Mary Jane Mastrangelo – yes, Melissa Ferretti – yes, Chair Meier – yes, and Judith Froman – abstain. 4-0-1.

ii. Blight Bylaw.

Ms. Mastrangelo said she brought this one on because there was a discussion last fall, and nothing has been done about it yet that she is aware of. She said that she has had people go to her saying that it is important to them. She wants this to be put on a list for discussion for the Board to have in terms of policy and process.

7.f. Discussion of the status of 9 Sandwich Road (the Keene House) as requested by the historical Commission.

Karl Spilhaus, a member of the Historical Commission in Bourne, said he is there to ask for the passage of the resolution to promote the saving of what is probably the oldest house in Bourne. He said that if action is not taken before the beginning of May, then it is very likely that the house will be destroyed. The Historical Commission has examined several scenarios by which the house can be saved, although it cannot be done without a buy in from the Town.

Mr. Spilhaus said that they are looking at moving the house across the road. The moving costs will be approximately \$50,000. The building would be used for historical purpose. Chair Meier asked Ms. McCollem if a structural engineer should look at this house before any money is spent on moving it. Ms. McCollem said that she cannot recommend that the Board investigate a property that they do not own. Ms. Mastrangelo said that there is a CPA application for the group to obtain funds to move the house, and there are probably steps that need to happen and she thinks it's important for the Board to decide whether they want to support the resolution.

Ms. McCollem said that there is confusion at every level regarding this house. She said that before she can make any decision, she needs to know who is going to own this. She said that the Town staff cannot work on private property. She does not know if this is possible without it being Town owned and none of it has been brought forward for Town Meeting. Mr. MacDonald said that more clarity, facts, and information are needed before he can make any type of decision. Mr. Spilhaus said that they are not asking for this to be a staff driven project, they are asking for the Town to endorse the resolution that has been drafted by the Historical Commission.

Voted: Mary Jane Mastrangelo moved, and Judith Froman seconded that the Select Board supports the resolution of the Historic Commission for 9 Sandwich Road, the Keene House. **Vote:** Jared MacDonald – yes, Melissa Ferretti – yes, Judith Froman – yes, Chair Meier – yes, and Mary Jane Mastrangelo – yes. 5-0-0.

Voted: Judith Froman moved, and Jared MacDonald seconded to appoint MJ Mastrangelo as the liaison for the 9 Sandwich Road project.

Vote: Jared MacDonald – yes, Judith Froman – yes, Chair Meier – yes, Melissa Ferretti – yes, and Mary Jane Mastrangelo – yes. 5-0-0.

7.g. Discussion and possible vote to accept a \$100. donation to the Council on Aging.

Voted: Melissa Ferretti moved, and Mary Jane Mastrangelo seconded to accept a \$100. donation from Nancy Pratt on behalf of the Council on Aging.

Vote: Jared MacDonald – yes, Mary Jane Mastrangelo – yes. Melissa Ferretti – yes, Judith Froman – yes, and Chair Meier – yes.5-0-0.

7.h. Discussion and possible vote to declare ISWM's Diamond Z 1463 Tub Grinder as surplus equipment.

The Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (MassDEP) has under review the Air Force Civil Engineer Center (AFCEC) response to comments letter (RCL2) dated January 20, 2023, in response to MassDEP comments dated June 22, 2022, for the document **"Draft Remedial Investigation Report for Per- and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances at Tanker Truck Rollover Sites, Joint Base Cape Cod, Massachusetts"** dated March 2022 (the TTRS RI). The RCL2 included a red-line strike-out revision of the TTRS RI. The TTRS RI presents the findings of the Remedial Investigation for per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) at the Tanker Truck Rollover Sites at Joint Base Cape Cod.

The AFCEC has requested MassDEP comments within thirty (30) days (i.e., by February 19, 2023). Please be advised that MassDEP requires additional time for review and expects to provide comments to the AFCEC within the next few weeks (i.e., by March 17, 2023).

This time frame is reasonable in consideration of the fact that it took the AFCEC seven (7) months to provide RCL2 and a red-line strike-out version of the TTRS RI to the regulatory agencies for review, and that the TTRS RI includes a significantly revised human health and ecological risk assessment for PFAS.

The Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (MassDEP) has reviewed the Air Force Civil Engineer Center (AFCEC) responses to comments letter (RCL) dated January 25, 2023, issued for MassDEP comments dated December 6, 2022, for the document **"Draft Uniform Federal Policy–Quality Assurance Project Plan Addendum 1: Polycyclic Aromatic Hydrocarbon Groundwater Investigation Joint Base Cape Cod, Massachusetts"** dated November 2022 (the QAPP Addendum). The QAPP Addendum describes the management and technical approach for a proposed groundwater investigation of potential fuel-related contamination (i.e., polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons [PAHs]) detected during the Military Munitions Response Program (MMRP) Remedial Investigation (RI) at the Skeet Range Munitions Response Area (MRA) at JBCC. MassDEP offers the following comments on the RCL.

MassDEP does not agree with the AFCEC's responses to MassDEP's comments. MassDEP's letter noted that the QAPP Addendum indicated that 25,000-gallon underground storage tanks (USTs) and gasoline traps, which were formerly present upgradient of the Area of Interest (AOI), are a potential source of the fuel-related PAHs detected in 75-GW-1. It was also stated in the QAPP Addendum that a fuel odor was detected in a groundwater sample collected at sampling location 75-GW-1.

The QAPP Addendum proposes installing a drive point (75-GW-4) adjacent to sampling location 75-GW-1 and analyze groundwater samples from this drive point for PAHs. MassDEP recommended that drive point 75-GW-4 be installed as the first sampling location and that groundwater samples from 75-GW-4 also be analyzed using MassDEP extractable petroleum hydrocarbon (EPH)/volatile petroleum hydrocarbon (VPH) analytical methods. This has been a standard practice when evaluating petroleum releases at JBCC (i.e., Petroleum Fuel Storage Area (PFSA) and Fire Training Area-2 (FTA-2)). The AFCEC did not agree with MassDEP's recommendation to perform VPH/EPH sampling of the groundwater samples from 75-GW-4. MassDEP reiterates its request for VPH/EPH analysis of the groundwater samples from 75-GW-4, at least for

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those samples located at and immediately above and below the vertical interval where a fuel odor was noted in 75-GW-1 (i.e., 48 feet below ground surface).

MassDEP also recommended that groundwater samples obtained during the proposed groundwater investigation be analyzed for per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS). The PAH AOI overlaps the Former Building 118 site. The Former Building 118 site is located immediately upgradient of 75-GW-1 and is an area where time and distance training using aqueous film forming foam (AFFF) was historically conducted near the building resulting in PFAS contamination of soil and groundwater. Concentrations exceeding the Massachusetts Maximum Contaminant Level (MMCL) of 20 nanograms per liter (ng/L) for drinking water for the sum of six PFAS (PFAS6) have recently been detected in upgradient and downgradient groundwater samples obtained near 75-GW-1. Analysis of groundwater samples obtained during the PAH groundwater investigation for PFAS6 will help to further delineate the magnitude and extent of PFAS6 contamination in this area.

PFAS6 sampling of groundwater samples will also help provide for characterization of any investigation derived liquids, including purge water or water extracted for the development of drive points, so that any investigation derived liquids contaminated with PFAS6 can be handled in a manner consistent with the Flight Line Area Groundwater Operable Unit Standard Operating Procedure for investigation-derived liquids containing PFAS. The AFCEC did not agree with MassDEP's request to perform PFAS6 analysis of groundwater samples obtained during the PAH groundwater investigation. MassDEP reiterates its request for PFAS6 analysis of groundwater samples.

MassDEP recommends that the Remediation Program Managers from MassDEP, the AFCEC and the EPA meet to discuss the RCL and to resolve comments on the QAPP Addendum.

The Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (MassDEP) has reviewed the document **"Draft J-2 Range Eastern Environmental Monitoring Report for November 2021 through October 2022"** (the Report) dated February 2023. The Report provides an assessment of the J-2 Range Eastern groundwater extraction, treatment, and re-infiltration system operations and groundwater monitoring performed by the Impact Area Groundwater Study Program (IAGWSP) from November 2021 through October 2022. MassDEP offers the following comments on the Report.

General Comment:

Response actions taken by the IAGWSP for the J-2 Range Eastern groundwater plume have significantly reduced the magnitude and extent of perchlorate and hexahydro-1,3,5-trinitro-1,3,5-triazine (RDX) in the aquifer over time. Perchlorate was observed at concentrations above the Massachusetts Maximum Contaminant Level (MMCL) of 2 μ g/L in only four monitoring wells in the J-2 Range Eastern chemical monitoring network during the reporting period. RDX was observed at concentrations above the risk-based concentration of 0.6 μ g/L in only five monitoring wells in the J-2 Range Eastern chemical monitoring network during the reporting period.

However, despite major improvements in the J-2 Range Eastern groundwater, the Report indicates that the model-predicted perchlorate and RDX groundwater cleanup times using the 2022 perchlorate and RDX plume shells are significantly longer than the cleanup times predicted in the *Decision Document*, *J-2 Range Operable Unit, Camp Edwards, Joint Base Cape Cod, Massachusetts*, dated September 2013 (the DD). The predicted aquifer restoration time is six years longer for perchlorate and 11 years longer for

MassDEP notes that the highest concentrations of perchlorate (49.0 μ g/L) and RDX (7.6 μ g/L) in the J-2 Range Eastern plume over the past several years have been observed in monitoring well MW-368M1.

Concentration trend plots provided in <u>Figure 5-6</u>, *J-2 Range Eastern Groundwater Perchlorate Trends* and <u>Figure 5-11</u>; *J-2 Range Eastern Groundwater RDX Trends* of the Report indicate the perchlorate and RDX concentrations in MW-368M1 began rapidly increasing in 2006 and 2011, respectively, but have remained relatively stable when compared to RDX and perchlorate concentrations in the shallower MW-368M2 screen where perchlorate and RDX concentrations have shown a consistent downward trend since reaching peak concentrations in 2008 and 2013, respectively.

The perchlorate and RDX concentration trends in MW-368M1 and M2 suggest that the contamination in the vicinity of the M1 screen may be in a lower hydraulic conductivity zone than the M2 screen. Another contributing factor for the persistence of elevated perchlorate and RDX concentrations in the M1 screen may be that the contamination is in a zone of minimal hydraulic movement due to the location of MW-368 between upgradient extraction well J2EW0004 and downgradient extraction well J2EW0005, which may exert competing hydraulic stresses on this area of the aquifer. MassDEP has made similar observations in previous J-2 Range Eastern comment letters to the IAGWSP.

The groundwater potentiometric maps provided as <u>Figure 4-2</u>; *J-2 Range Eastern Groundwater Potentiometric Map for 27 April 2022* and <u>Figure 4-3</u>; *J-2 Range Eastern Groundwater Potentiometric Map for 9 August 2022* indicate that groundwater in the vicinity of MW-368 is being pulled towards both the upgradient extraction well J2EW0004 and the downgradient extraction well J2EW0005 as evidenced by the flow vectors. The model-predicted capture zone provided in <u>Figure 6-1</u>; *Model-Predicted Capture Zone for J-2 Range Eastern 2022 Operational Conditions* suggests a similar hydraulic condition.

A possible explanation for why contamination is more persistent in the deeper screen than the shallower screen at MW-368 may be the greater hydraulic influence of the extraction wells with increasing depth in the aquifer. The perchlorate and RDX B-B' cross-sections provided in <u>Figure 5-3</u>; *J-2 Range Eastern Plume Cross Section B-B' Measured Perchlorate Distributions* and <u>Figure 5-8</u>; *J-2 Range Eastern Plume Cross Section B-B' Measured RDX Distributions indicate that the capture zones for the extraction wells generally extend further downgradient with increasing depth in the aquifer. This is likely due to the lower hydraulic conductivities assigned in the model to the deeper portion of the aquifer.*

To overcome this effect, MassDEP recommends that the IAGWSP evaluate operational adjustments to the J-2 Range Eastern extraction system. These operational adjustments include pulsed operation of upgradient extraction well J2EW0004; reducing the flow rate at upgradient extraction well J-2EW0004 and increasing the flow rate at downgradient extraction well J2EW0005; packering off the bottom portion of the extraction well J2EW0004 well screen; and sealing off the upper well screen at downgradient extraction to evaluate potential optimization opportunities was made to the IAGWSP in the March 17, 2022, MassDEP comment letter on the *Draft J-2 Range Eastern 2021 Environmental Monitoring Report* dated February 2022. Various operational adjustments could be implemented individually or in combination on a trial basis to determine the effectiveness of the adjustments in eliminating the hydraulic flat zone that the highest concentrations of perchlorate and RDX appear to be immobilized in.

The J-2 Range and the J-2 Range Eastern groundwater plume are located within the Upper Cape Water Supply Reserve and the J-2 Range Eastern groundwater plume is within the approved MassDEP Zone II wellhead protection area for Upper Cape Water Supply Cooperative public water supply Well 1, which

supplies drinking water to upper Cape Cod. The Upper Cape Water Supply Reserve is co-located within Camp Edwards' 15,000-acre northern training area and was established by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts Chapter 47 of the Acts of 2002 as public conservation land dedicated, in part, to water supply and wildlife habitat protection and the development and construction of public water supply systems. There is an opportunity at the J-2 Range Eastern groundwater plume to protect the public water supply groundwater resource more aggressively by implementing operational adjustments to the J-2 Range Eastern extraction system.

These modifications (individually or in combination) would likely reduce the hydraulic influence of extraction well J2EW0004 upon MW-368M1, which would allow the higher contaminant concentrations in MW-368M1 to migrate downgradient to extraction well J2EW0005. These modifications should still allow for the capture of elevated perchlorate and RDX concentrations in the vicinity of monitoring well MW-668M1, which is the only monitoring well in Zone 1 upgradient of J2EW0004 that had concentrations of perchlorate (22.0 μ g/L) and RDX (1.6 μ g/L) above the perchlorate MMCL and the RDX RBC during the reporting period. These adjustments will likely improve the overall predicted cleanup times for perchlorate and RDX in the J-2 Range Eastern plume as perchlorate and RDX contamination in the vicinity of MW-368M1 would be subject to more targeted extraction stress.

Page-specific Comments:

1. Page 5-1, Section 5.0, Chemical Monitoring:

The Report states, "Generally, a detailed evaluation is not completed until an optimization of the system is deemed warranted, and at this time, capture of contamination is being achieved and an optimization is not currently under consideration." Please refer to the General Comment of this letter regarding recommended optimization to shorten predicted J-2 Range Eastern plume restoration times.

- 2. Page 5-3, Section 5.1.1, Chemical Monitoring, Perchlorate, Zone 2 J2EW0004 to J2EW0005:
 - The Report indicates, **"The MW-665 cluster was installed to assess the upgradient extent of the perchlorate plume identified at MW-368M1/M2 and was thought to lie in an area with an artificially low hydraulic gradient caused by the combined effects of pumping at extraction wells J-2EW0004 and J-2EW0005; however, falling concentrations in MW-665M3 suggest that contamination is migrating downgradient of this area."** The groundwater potentiometric maps provided as <u>Figure 4-</u> *2; J-2 Range Eastern Groundwater Potentiometric Map for 27 April 2022* and <u>Figure 4-3</u>; *J-2 Range Eastern Groundwater Potentiometric Map for 9 August 2022* indicate that groundwater in the vicinity of MW-665 is being pulled towards the upgradient extraction well J2EW0004 as evidenced by the flow vectors. The model-predicted capture zones provided in <u>Figure 6-1</u>; *Model-Predicted Capture Zone for J-2 Range Eastern 2022 Operational Conditions* suggest that groundwater in the vicinity of MW-665 is on the edge of the downgradient extent of the capture zone of extraction well J2EW0004. Please provide the rationale for the statement that contamination in the vicinity of MW-665 is migrating downgradient of this area. The measured hydraulic data indicates that contamination in the vicinity of MW-665 is migrating towards upgradient extraction well J2EW0004.
- Page 5-3, Section 5.1.1, Chemical Monitoring, Perchlorate, Zone 2 J2EW0004 to J2EW0005: The Report states, "The above-mentioned wells are located within the capture zone of J2EW0005." Please indicate which wells this statement is referring to.

- 4. Page 6-1, Section 6.1, Groundwater Modeling, J-2 Range Eastern Plume ETR System Capture Zone:
- The Report indicates, "Discrepancies between observed and predicted water levels indicate that the capture zone predicted by the model on an annual basis may not provide an exact representation of capture at the time the water levels are collected; however, over the long term, the capture zone predicted by the model adequately represents the capture zone of the system and, as long as the predicted plume extent remains reliable, it will reflect the ability of the ETR system to effectively capture areas of contamination." MassDEP agrees that the model-predicted capture zones indicate that the J-2 Range Eastern plume is being successfully captured by the extraction system. However, when compared to observed hydraulic conditions, the model underestimates the downgradient extent of the capture zone for extraction well J2EW0004. Precedence should always be given to observed hydraulic conditions. Please see the General Comment of this letter and Page-specific Comment #2.
- 5. <u>Page 6-2, Section 6.2.1, Groundwater Modeling, Model Predictions versus Observed Concentrations,</u> <u>Perchlorate</u>:

The Report states, **"In general, as the plume migrates laterally and vertically it tends to spread out by dispersion and to flow toward downgradient extraction wells, as hydrologic gradients permit."** MassDEP notes that flow toward downgradient extraction wells is typically the case, but this may not be the case for portions of the plume located within areas of an extraction well capture zone that extend laterally or downgradient of the extraction well. Please qualify the text.

6. <u>Page 7-1, Section 7.1.1, Comparison to Decision Document Cleanup Progress, Cleanup Time</u> <u>Comparisons, Perchlorate</u>:

The Report indicates, **"The perchlorate cleanup time specified in the Decision Document was indicated to be year 2027. Simulation of the J-2 Range Eastern perchlorate plume using the 2022 perchlorate plume shell indicates that cleanup to 2 \mug/L in the productive part of the aquifer will occur by 2033 (Zone 1 cleanup by 2028, Zone 2 cleanup by 2033, and Zone 3 cleanup by pre-2023)." Please refer to the General Comment of this letter for recommended system modifications to shorten perchlorate cleanup times in Zone 2.**

7. <u>Page 7-2, Section 7.1.2, Comparison to Decision Document Cleanup Progress, Cleanup Time</u> <u>Comparisons, RDX</u>:

The Report states, **"The RDX cleanup time specified in the Decision Document was indicated to be** year 2022. Simulation of the J-2 Range Eastern RDX plume using the 2022 RDX plume shell indicates that cleanup to 0.60 μ g/L in the productive part of the aquifer will occur by 2033 (Zone 1 cleanup by 2024, Zone 2 cleanup by 2033, and Zone 3 cleanup by 2029) and cleanup to 0.97 μ g/L, which is the EPA RSL and is close to the Massachusetts DEP's GW-1 concentration of 1 μ g/L, in the productive part of the aquifer will occur by 2032 (Zone 1 cleanup by pre-2023, Zone 2 cleanup by 2032, and Zone 3 cleanup by 2026)." Please refer to the General Comment of this letter for recommended system modifications to shorten RDX cleanup times in Zone 2.

8. Page 8-1, Section 8.1, Recommendations, Plant Operation and Sampling:

The Report indicates, "During the reporting period, the J-2 Range Eastern plume ETR systems have operated as designed. These systems have resulted in no effluent discharges of the COCs. Thus, the J-2 Range Eastern plume ETR system is treating groundwater as designed, and no changes are recommended to the current system operating and monitoring procedures." Please refer to the

General Comment of this letter for recommended system modifications to shorten plume cleanup times.

9. Page 8-1, Section 8.2, Recommendations, Wellfield Recommendations:

The Report states, "A plume shell update will be developed in 2027 for perchlorate and RDX, see Section 8.5. If the result of the modeling efforts identifies that cleanup time are improving and tracking closer to the DD dates, than an optimization analysis (pulsed pumping and simulating a shorter extraction well screen) may not be warranted. The IAGWSP will discuss the need for such an analysis with the regulators." MassDEP suggests that there is a benefit to implementing various optimization approaches for the J-2 Range Eastern extraction system prior to the 2027 plume shell update. Please refer to the General Comment of this letter.



Thank you to the online comment responders for acknowledging my verbal comments from the June 24, 2023, Public Information Meeting (PIM) and for printing the reply provided by Mark Kolonoski at that meeting.

(See attached screen image of the online comment chat posting at the end of this email.)

I respectfully disagree with Mark Kolonoski's reply. Mark states there was a Public Involvement Plan (PIP) in place in June, 2021, and that it was subsequently under review. If there was a PIP in place, that PIP should not have been suspended simply because it was under review. In any case, the PIP should not have been suspended without informing the public and particularly should not have been suspended without informing key stakeholders such as the host community, which is the Town of Bourne. In fact, the stakeholder advisory panel should have been a participant is any review of the PIP, should right now be a participant in the process to develop a PIP which Mr. Kolonoski describes as occurring now, and should be a participant in the establishment of any future PIP.

Mr. Kolonoski states, "There have been a lot of evolutions in the schedule and a lot that has evolved in terms of pace of design and alternative developments."

Mr Kolonoski then goes on to state, "Up to this time it has not been appropriate to convene that panel until we had alternatives to discuss and to have meaningful dialog with that panel."

If MassDOT is qualified to lead this program, it should understand the purpose and value of public involvement. Mr. Kolonoski's statement makes it clear that MassDOT does not.

Participation of a stakeholder advisory panel is essential while developing scope, purpose and need, and when developing alternatives for general public review. The program should not have gone forward without first establishing and convening the originally envisioned and promised advisory group.

This program has had a project number for several years. MassDOT's Project Review Committee approved this program to go forward based on a program description that included a stakeholder advisory panel that was to be established in 2021. If MassDOT and/or MassDOT's program managers for this project wanted to abandon or suspend the advisory panel, MassDOT or the program managers should have informed the Project Review Committee and should have informed stakeholders so that stakeholders could request the Program managers and the Project Review Committee to maintain the advisory panel.

The program should not have gone forward with discussions with FHWA to revamp the program without informing stakeholders that those discussions were occurring.

MassDOT owes the stakeholders of this program a sincere apology for failing to make good on a promise and commitment made in June 2021 to stand up an advisory panel in August 2021 and for failing to inform the stakeholders when it abandoned that commitment. I am sure MassDOT can do better going forward. That should start by standing up an advisory panel right away. Don't worry so much about who is on the panel when it is first stood up. Put the obvious members on the panel to start. Those could be representatives of:



Peter, Judy and all Select Board members,

Can Bourne apply for a grant to help connect our town? Would the granting entity be surprised where the "highway" is a canal? What would our project be?

I think the project might be something that really helps, but that MassDOT is not likely to fund. Here are possibilities:

1. Legal fees to pay Town Counsel for research to allow Bourne to advocate for better solutions for Canal impacted mobility.

2. Non-bridge options for cross-canal mobility: Water taxi and/or rail trolley-shuttle using existing railroad bridge.


3. Combine this grant with Safe Routes to School funds for to provide truly high quality access to Canal Service Paths. The Canal Area/Bridges Program might do this, but most likely will not. The most the Canal Area Program is likely to do is the minimum to connect bridges to paths. Bourne needs and wants more. We should have multiple access points along the Canal Path: Keene Street, which the schools use for walking field trips to the Canal Path and to Aptucxet Trading Post Museeum. Gallo Ice Arena, used by school hockey teams. Upper Cape Cod Regional Technical High School and Bourne Braves/Doran Field could use the Gallo path access point.

The Canal Area Program is not funded and is years away. Official recognition of Keene Street and Gallo pedestrian rail crossings (required for access to Canal Path) would be helpful now. The Canal Area Program is supposed to prioritize non-bridge solutions that can be completed ahead of bridge replacement, but most likely will not. Even if the Canal Area Program choses to take on this rail crossings project, it might not have funds to do so.

Pedestrian rail crossings cost about \$150,000. each. There is no need to acquire real estate at either Keene Street or Gallo. The only need is Army Corps and MassDOT approval and co-operation. Possibly also same from Mass Coastal Railroad ... Once again, there will likely be legal fees if the Town is to educate itself to know how to make the case to MassDOT Rail Division and Mass Coastal Railroad.

This is what I meant when I suggested the Town will need Town Counsel if we want a truly wonderful outcome.

Dear Members of the Select Board and Town Administrator McCollem,

In a story in the Cape Cod Times February 26, 2023, Keith Barber, president of the Pocasset Water Quality Coalition describes the inability of his family to shellfish for softshell clams. Degraded water quality in Hens Cove, mostly from septic systems and lawn fertilizers are continuing to degrade Cape Cod's shore and pond waters.

The article presents the most recent findings of the Association to Preserve Cape Cod that most embayments have unacceptable water quality. The statistics are frightening: 90% of the Cape's 48 embayments that were evaluated were found to unacceptable water quality. More than half of the evaluated ponds on Cape Cod failed water quality tests.

Failing water quality could be better addressed in the Bourne by hiring a Director of Clean Water reporting to the Town Administrator to provide a professional addressing day-to-day management of Bourne's water quality issues. A person who would be responsible for acting on Bourne's behalf to provide the Select Board, acting as Sewer Commissioners and the Town Administrator a fulltime member of the administration to monitor and execute Bourne's degrading water quality.

To pay for this position, I suggest the annual 3% tax now added to real estate taxes be reduced to accommodate additional resources for this position and to support the cost of implementing the design and construction of wastewater treatment infrastructure. I also support taking part of this 3% Tax and re-allocating it to our Wastewater projects. We can't continue to operate our limited sewering services off the few residents, including many seniors. We need to develop a town wide tax to support a town wide issue, poor and degrading water quality.

The long-time use of a parttime Board of Sewer Commissioners who also work parttime as members of the Select Board must be supported with professionals who can work fulltime for the town of Bourne.

I hope you will add such a discussion to one of your future meetings. This is not the first time I have suggested such a diversion of tax money for wastewater, and other towns including Mashpee and Orleans have already accomplished this change. We currently have over \$1 Million dollars in our CPA funds, and amount that indicates an over taxation and underutilization of precious taxpayer dollars.

Mr. Degan nominated Mr. Corriveau for Vice-Chairperson, seconded by Mr. Cammarano. Roll call vote. Motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Corriveau was re-elected as Vice-Chairperson to the Upper Cape Cod Regional Vocational-Technical School District.

Treasurer Position:

Mr. Corriveau nominated Mr. Degan for Treasurer, seconded by Ms. Marcolini. <u>Roll call</u> vote. Motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Degan was re-elected as Treasurer to the Upper Cape Cod Regional Vocational-Technical School District.

Secretary Position:

Mr. Degan nominated Ms. Brito for Secretary, seconded by Ms. Smith. <u>Roll call vote.</u> <u>Motion passed unanimously.</u>

Ms. Brito was re-elected as Secretary to the Upper Cape Cod Regional Vocational-Technical School District Committee.

<u>STUDENT ADVISORY REPRESENTATIVE:</u> Madison Neal, a senior in Information Technology, and Brayden Oliver, a junior in Engineering, updated the committee on recent student activities including the Honor Roll Ice Cream Sundae Party and an update on the winter sports teams. They also discussed future plans of the InterAct Club which includes a Valentine's candygram and carnation sale and a possible car wash.

<u>STUDENT SPOTLIGHT / CURRICULUM UPDATE:</u> Mr. Genereau, Advisor of the Drama Club, spoke about the recent dinner theater the club put on. Mr. Genereau shared that Mr. Forget approached him ten years ago and asked him to bring drama back to UCT and the club has continued to grow since that time. There were three performances of "Café Murder" over the weekend and the evening shows sold out on both nights. So many students auditioned for the performance that there were two casts. This is the third dinner production that the Drama Club and the Culinary Arts program have collaborated on. The club will now begin preparing for a full musical of the Little Shop of Horrors and for the Massachusetts Educational Theater Guild's High School Drama Festival, both of which will take place in March.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION: None.

<u>APPROVAL OF MINUTES:</u> A <u>motion</u> was made by Mr. Degan, seconded by Mr. Cammarano, for approval of the minutes of the December 8, 2022 regular meeting. <u>Motion passed unanimously</u>.

<u>COMMUNICATIONS</u>: The Superintendent read a letter from Deborah Stacy, Special Education teacher, indicating her intention to retire on June 27, 2023. He also read a thank you note to the Culinary Arts staff and students from the residents of Southport expressing their appreciation for the superb luncheon and for the culinary demonstrations shown to the group.

REPORT OF COMMITTEES:

Budget – The Budget Sub-Committee met on January 3rd and was presented with a preliminary budget for FY2024 with preliminary assumptions based on FY2023.

<u>TREASURER'S REPORT</u>: Mr. Degan distributed the Treasurer's Report for warrants #24, #26 and #28 highlighting the larger expenditures on the warrants including cafeteria food, student busing, health insurance, utilities and the purchase of an automotive lift.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT: Mr. Forget informed the committee that he presented a preliminary FY24 budget to the Budget Sub-Committee. The preliminary budget was based on assumptions from the FY23 budget and was an overall increase of 7%. He is still awaiting the Governor's House 1 budget and will not be able to formulate a more accurate budget until the cherry sheets are received from the state. The Superintendent shared that Cape Cod Municipal Health Group has informed the district that there will be a 5% increase in health insurance costs. Mr. Forget stated that he has been contacted by the Executive Director of the Massachusetts Association of School Business Officials inquiring if the district would be interested in working with the Inspector General's Office regarding the procurement of electric busses as the district has received both state and federal grant monies for this initiative. He also received a letter from the Governor's Office stating that the district has been selected to receive a grant award of \$100,000 for planning and implementation resources as part of the Nursing Pathways Grant Program from CNA to LPN. The district is also the recipient of a \$250,000 grant to purchase equipment for the Electrical program. Additionally, we should be receiving news regarding continuation of the Summer Career Exploration grant to fund our summer programs again this summer. The Board of Registration in Nursing has voted to continue full approval of the Practical Nursing program. Two lifts have been replaced in The foundation for the storage Automotive Technology, with seven more to follow. building for Environmental Technology is nearing completion. The storage building will be 36' x 100' with six overhead doors. The Superintendent distributed a mockup for a new design for the top portion of the baseball scoreboard which will be funded by the Bourne Braves and asked for the committee's input on the design. The committee agreed that "UCT Rams" should precede "Bourne Braves" and be in blue lettering rather than black.

<u>PRINCIPAL'S REPORT:</u> Mr. Greeley informed the committee that Henry Knox has been chosen as the Outstanding Vocational Student of the Year. Henry is a resident of Falmouth and is in the Engineering shop. He has also been nominated as a Presidential Scholar and submitted his application for admission to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology earlier this week. Rylan Tellier, who is also a Falmouth resident and in the Engineering shop, has been chosen to receive the Walter J. Markham Award. The Principal reported that there are currently 120 students out on co-op with year-to-date earnings of over \$277,000. Carpentry students are currently the highest paid at an average hourly rate of \$19.00. At this point in the year, 122 students have been accepted for fall admission. He met with representatives from a solar company last week to discuss charging options for the electric busses that the school will be obtaining through the grant. There have been major improvements to the Automotive shop including the installation of new lifts and improved lighting. The program is undergoing their Automotive Service Excellence (ASE) re-certification this week. The Engineering students are working on creating topographical maps for the new football field.

attended a seminar on mental health at the Museum of Science in Boston. In Carpentry, students constructed a flag box for a Korean War veteran. The flag box will house medals as well and will be presented to the veteran at a ceremony in the near future.

FY24 LPN Tuition – Mr. Degan made a <u>motion</u>, seconded by Mr. Corriveau, to follow the recommendation of the Budget Sub-Committee and increase the LPN tuition for FY24 from \$10,350 to \$10,550 for in-district students; from \$11,600 to \$11,800 for out-of-district students; and from \$13,850 to \$14,050 for out-of-state students. <u>Motion passed unanimously</u>. The Superintendent explained that these rates will include the lab fees for the program which will now allow those fees to be incorporated into the Pell grants that eligible students receive.

Massachusetts School Building Authority Statement of Interest – Mr. Forget explained that the district's application for roof replacement and construction of a new gymnasium was not selected for funding last spring, but he was encouraged by MSBA to submit another application for this round. Mr. Cammarano made a <u>motion</u>, seconded by Mr. Degan, having convened in an open meeting on January 12, 2023, prior to the closing date, the School Committee of Upper Cape Cod Regional Vocational-Technical School, in accordance with its charter, by-laws, and ordinances, has voted to authorize the Superintendent to submit to the Massachusetts School Building Authority the Statement of Interest dated February 3, 2023 for the Upper Cape Cod Regional Technical School located at 220 Sandwich Road in Bourne, Massachusetts which describes and explains the following deficiencies and the priority category(s) for which an application may be submitted to the Massachusetts School Building Authority in the future; specifically for a roof replacement, construction of a new gymnasium, and reconfiguration of existing gymnasium into a cafeteria; and hereby further specifically acknowledges that by submitting this Statement of Interest Form, the Massachusetts School Building Authority

in no way guarantees the acceptance or the approval of an application, the awarding of a grant or any other funding commitment from the Massachusetts School Building Authority, or commits the Upper Cape Cod Regional Vocational-Technical School District to filing an application for funding with the Massachusetts School Building Authority. <u>Motion passed unanimously.</u>

Director of Special Education Position – Mr. Forget reminded the committee that Mr. Dufresne will be retiring at the conclusion of the school year and that the Director of Special Education is one of three positions that is selected by the School Committee. He stated that he will be posting for the position in February and that he and Mr. Greeley will review the applicants with a selection committee. They will put together a short list of finalists to bring before the School Committee.

Mr. Degan made a <u>motion</u>, seconded by Mr. Cammarano, to adjourn the regular meeting at 7:35 P.M. <u>Motion passed unanimously</u>.

If you allow others to use your Comcast or Xfinity accounts or Services, we will also collect personal information about those individuals. If you use our Services through someone else's account, we will collect information about you, but it may not identify who you are to us. We may also collect information about you from third parties **①**.

We collect this information to provide our Services, communicate with you, respond to your requestsD, and to tailor our ServicesD to best meet your needs and interests.

What We Collect

- Account Information Information we use to identify who you are and/or to provide or maintain your account and Services, which may include biometric information, such as
 audio recordings and facial scans when used as a means of identification

- Billing Information Information including your financial transactions that are available on your billing statements and other payment receipts
- Contact Information Information such as your full name and telephone number that we use to stay in contact with you
- Demographic and Interest Information Information we obtain from other companies to better tailor our programming, marketing, and advertising services to you
- Service Activity Information Information associated with your use of our Services

In some cases, California requires that we use different names to describe the categories of information that we collect. For more information about these categories, please see the Special Information Regarding California Residents' Privacy Rights, below.

How We Collect Personal Information

We collect personal information about you in several ways.

- 1. Directly from you when you create an account or interact with our customer service, such as:
 - · Contact information, which may include your name, mailing address, email address, or telephone number
 - · Login credentials for our Services, such as your username and password
 - · Biometric information, such as audio recordings for voiceprints and facial scans that we create in the identity verification process
 - Customer communications records, including records of calls and chats with our customer service representatives
 - Information that you provide when interacting with us on our social media pages, message boards, and other forums, including your username, profile pictures, and comments, as well as information you publicly share about us
 - Photographs (1) or images of your property
 - · Payment information, such as your credit/debit card or other financial account information
 - Your Social Security number
 - · Your driver's license, state identification cards, or other forms of identification
 - · Legal documents, such as documentation of the authority to act on behalf of another person
- 2. When you use or interact with our Services, such as:
 - · Household and device video selection and viewing activity①

- Voice commands and audio recordings made through voice activated devices that are part of the Services, such as the Voice Remote or our app-based remote
- · Geolocation information on where you are at a specific point in time based on your service address to help us authenticate you) for certain services on our platform
- IP addresses, device identifiers, and network equipment addresses when devices connect to our Services, and other device information, including information about Devices
 provided by other companies from which you use our Services
- User activity information, including what you search and how long you use our websites and applications, using cookies and other technologies (Cookie Notice: https://www. xfinity.com/privacy/policy/cookienotice), and information provided by other companies when you integrate their services with our Services ①
- Domain Name Server or "DNS" () searches and network traffic activity () when you use our Services, such as Xfinity Internet, Xfinity Mobile or Xfinity WiFi
- Geolocation information that indicates where your device is at a specific point in time when you use Xfinity Mobile or enable that function in our mobile apps ①
- General location information, such as the city or ZIP Code that correlates with the location of a WiFi service access point or with the license of your device IP address when you use Xfinity Internet or Xfinity WiFi
- The quantity, technical configuration, type, features, call history, and amount of your use of voice services (known as Customer Proprietary Network Information or "CPNI")
- · Video and audio recordings (if you have turned these features on) when you use Xfinity Home security and automation

3. From third parties, such as:

- · Credit reporting agencies and other entities that provide credit scoring, identity verification, fraud prevention, and similar services
- · Landlords and property owners that provide contact and other information
- · Government entities that offer public records
- Consumer data providers that offer demographic(), interest(), purchase(), and other data that we use to tailor our marketing and communications to your interest
- Providers of third-party apps that you use on devices governed by this privacy policy
- Social networks and other publicly available data, like Facebook①
- Online advertising companies who may share information about the marketing and advertisements you have seen or clicked on

We do not knowingly allow others to collect personally identifiable information about your online activities over time and across third-party websites when you use our online Services. Because definitions and rules for a "Do Not Track" standard have not yet been established, including whether such signals must be user-enabled, Comcast does not yet respond to "Do Not Track" signals sent from browsers. HOW AND WHEN WE USE INFORMATION, INCLUDING FOR MARKETING AND ADVERTISING

We use the information we collect to provide our Services and communicate with you. We also use it to improve our Services, develop new products and services, give recommendations, deliver personalized consumer experiences (including marketing and advertising for our own and others' products and services), investigate theft and other illegal activities, and to ensure a secure online environment.

We may combine information across our systems, platforms, and databases. This includes combining information we receive from third parties and information about your use of our Services. We may also combine information about your use of one Service with information we get from your use of another Service.

WHEN AND WITH WHOM WE SHARE INFORMATION

We do not sell, and have never sold, information that identifies who you are to anyone. This includes your Internet usage information, video usage information, or call detail information. We share personal information with others when it's needed to provide you with our Services, including with credit reporting agencies. We also share personal information with others:

- · When you direct us to do so, including to authorize other users on your account
- When required by law or to respond to legal process

· To protect our property or rights or the safety of our employees, our customers, or other individuals

If we share your personal information with other companies for their own marketing and advertising activities, we will first get your consent. This may be through opt-in or opt-out settings^①, depending on the type of personal information shared.

We may also share personal information that does not identify you with third parties for their own marketing and advertising purposes, which you can opt out of. This mainly occurs when you interact with our websites and mobile applications that contain third-party cookies or other advertising trackers. The Comcast Family of Businesses

If Comcast shares the personal information it collects about you with separate Comcast companies, such as NBCUniversal-branded companies, for their own marketing or advertising purposes, we will first give you the choice to opt out of or opt in to any sharing in the Xfinity Privacy Preferences Center. Account Owners and Other Authorized Users

We may share information about a customer's account and use of a Service to the primary account owner following appropriate authentication. The primary account owner may also allow others to see information on the account.

Service Providers

To provide and support the Services, sometimes we use other companies as service providers to transmit, collect, process, or store information for us. We require these service providers to treat the information we share with them as confidential and to use it only for providing their services to us. These include:

- · Billing and collection providers, such as payment processors and organizations that assist us in assessing your credit and payment status
- · Accounting, auditing, and tax providers
- Insurance providers
- Professional services providers, such as firms that provide consultative services, assist with improving our programming, provide legal services, or supply project-based resources and assistance
- Analytics services, including entities that analyze traffic to and on our websites, analyze how our Services are used, and assist with identifying and communicating with potential
 customers
- Marketing, advertising, and sales entities that assist us in creating and executing marketing, advertising, and sales programs, including order application processing, and
 printing, mailing, and electronic communications services
- Security providers, such as entities that assist with security incident verification and response, service notifications, fraud prevention, identity verification and management, and authentication
- · Information technology providers, such as entities that assist with website design, hosting, and maintenance, data and software storage, and network operations
- · Customer service support, including services related to our call centers, installation, maintenance, and repair services

Third Parties

We do not sell, and have never sold, information that personally identifies who you are to anyone. Although permitted by federal law, we do not disclose your name and address to non-governmental entities, such as charities or businesses, for their own marketing purposes.

Sometimes, you may ask us to share information that personally identifies you () with another company (). In that instance, we will make sure you give us clear direction about what you want us to share and with whom, before we share that information.

Other sharing with third parties can include:

Social Media Companies

You may interact with parts of our Services that cause information to be published to your social networks. For example, you may click on a Facebook "like" button, which publishes to your Facebook account that you "like" one of our Services. On those parts of our websites with social network functionality, a social network may be able to collect information about you. For example, if a page contains a Facebook "like" button, Facebook may be able to collect data about your visit to that page, even if you don't click on the "like" button. To control this sharing of information, please review the privacy policy of the relevant social network and/or sign out of it before you use our Services.

Online Advertising Partners

We may use cookies or other technology to deliver personalized advertising to you when you visit other websites, including advertising based on the products and services you viewed on our Services. We also allow our partners, including advertisers and service providers, to use cookies and similar tracking technologies when you use our Services. For more information about the use of cookies and other technologies on our online Services, please see the Cookies Policy (https://www.xfinity.com/privacy/policy/cookienotice).

Audience Measurement and Analytics Companies

We work with business partners to help us measure and analyze how our customers are using our Services. For video, this includes assessing which programs are most popular, how many people watch a program to its conclusion, whether people are watching advertisements, and what programming and video content we will carry on the Services. It also includes determining how our customers prefer to view certain kinds of programming when they use our Services, such as whether they like to watch certain programs live, or if they prefer to view them on demand, on mobile devices, or online. Our business partners may compile this information into reports with aggregated and anonymous statistics that are then made commercially available (for example, a ratings report that indicates what percentage of viewers watched a particular program live vs. on-demand). Xfinity Stream includes Nielsen's proprietary measurement software, which will allow users to contribute to market research, like Nielsen's television ratings. By visiting www.nielsen.com/ digitalprivacy, users can access more information about the measurement software and learn about their choices with regard to Nielsen's measurement.

Non-Xfinity Apps and Partners

Certain Services enable you to interact directly with technology provided by other companies, such as using a non-Xfinity video app available through our ServicesD, or accessing our Services through another company's platform or deviceD. When you use our Services in connection with any technology provided by another company, you are directing us to interact with that company and that company may collect information from you and our Services. This Privacy Policy does not cover the privacy practices of other companies. For more information about how those companies use your information, please review their privacy policies. For more information about non-Xfinity apps supported on our video Services, please visit https://my.xfinity.com/privacy/providers. Certain apps may also run using technology provided by Metrological, a Comcast company, whose privacy practices are described at https://www.metrological.com/platformprivacystatement.

Consumer Reporting Agencies

We disclose information that personally identifies you to consumer reporting agencies that may be subject to other laws, including the Fair Credit Reporting Act. These disclosures may include information that helps validate your identity, such as your name, current and former addresses, contact information, Social Security number, government-issued identifiers, your payment history and account status, and other identifying information.

Public Safety Authorities

If you have our Xfinity Voice service, Comcast will disclose your name and contact information to public safety authorities such as 911/E911 and related emergency services.

Directory Services, Assistance, and Caller ID

Your name, address, and telephone number may be sent to publishers to be printed in directories and posted in online directories. Once that information is printed or posted online, it is outside of our control and may be sorted or repackaged and made available again in different formats by anyone, including data aggregators, for a variety of purposes, including marketing. For a fee, you can choose to have a nonpublished number, which means that Comcast will not provide your name, address, and telephone number for publishing in the phone book and online directories. You can also choose to have a published number, but choose the "omit address feature," which means we will not provide your street address for publishing in the phone book and online directories. If initiating service online, select "non-published" option, otherwise call 1-800-XFINITY to sign up.

We may also make your number, name, and address available to directory assistance (411) providers. If you have a nonpublished number, Comcast will not make your number available through directory assistance. Comcast may still share your name and address with the 411 provider when specified by law (but the provider is not authorized to share your non-published number).

Please note: While the non-published feature will keep your name, address, and telephone number out of printed and online directories over which Comcast exercises control, even a non-published phone number may exist in databases not controlled by Comcast – if, for example, your present telephone number or address was previously published under your name, or if you provided this information to businesses or government agencies. One way to help protect your privacy may be to request assignment of a new telephone number (with which your name has not previously been associated). You may also want to activate Caller ID Blocking or select the do-not-call option.

Caller ID provides your name and telephone number to the person you are calling – even if you have a nonpublished number. Per Line Caller ID Blocking will automatically block Caller ID for all calls you make from your registered telephone number and can be activated by calling 1-800-XFINITY. Per Call Caller ID Blocking will block name and number on a per-call basis and can be activated by dialing *86 before each call you want to block.

Potential Purchasers of our Business

If we enter into a potential or actual merger, acquisition, or sale of all or a portion of our assets, then information about you and your subscription will, in most cases, be shared or transferred as part of the transaction. This includes information that personally identifies you. If this Policy will be changed as a result of such a transaction, you should refer below under "Changes to this Privacy Policy."

Government and Other Entities When Required by Law or To Protect Comcast and Others

There are times when we may be required by law to disclose information about you to third parties. This may happen with or without your consent, and with or without notice, in compliance with the terms of valid legal process such as a subpoena, court order, or search warrant.

If you subscribe to our Xfinity Video service, Comcast may be required to disclose information that personally identifies you to a governmental entity in response to a court order. In this case, the Cable Act requires that you be given the opportunity to appear in a court proceeding to contest any claims made in support of the court order, and the governmental entity must offer clear and convincing evidence that you are reasonably suspected of engaging in criminal activity and that the information sought would be material evidence in the case. For more information, see "Your Rights and Our Limitations Under Federal Laws."

If you subscribe to the Xfinity Internet, Voice, Mobile, or Home security and automation Services, Comcast may be required to disclose information that personally identifies you to a governmental entity in response to a subpoena, court order, or search warrant, depending on the type of information sought. We may be prohibited from notifying you of any such disclosures by the terms of the legal process.

A non-governmental entity, such as a civil litigant, can seek information that personally identifies you or your use of the Xfinity Video, Internet, or Voice Services only pursuant to a court order, and we are required by the Cable Act to notify you of such court order. If Comcast is required to give information that personally identifies you to a private third party in response to a civil court order for these or other Services, we will notify you prior to making such disclosure unless legally prohibited from doing so.

We may also disclose information that personally identifies you as permitted by law and without your consent when it is necessary to protect our customers, employees, or property; in emergency situations; or to enforce our rights under our terms of service and policies.

HOW WE PROTECT YOUR INFORMATION

We follow industry-standard practices to secure the information we collect to prevent the unauthorized access, use, or disclosure of any personal information we collect and maintain. These security practices include technical, administrative, and physical safeguards, which may vary, depending on the type and sensitivity of the information. Although we take the responsibility of safeguarding your personal information seriously, no security measures are 100% effective and we cannot guarantee that these practices will prevent every unauthorized attempt to access, use, or disclose your information. Comcast also takes additional steps to increase the security and reliability of customer communications. We do not read your outgoing or incoming email, file attachments, video mail, private chat, or instant messages. However, we (along with our service providers) use software and hardware tools to help prevent and block "spam" emails, viruses, spyware, and other harmful or unwanted communications and programs from being sent and received over Comcast.net email and the Comcast Services. To help protect you and the Services against these harmful or unwanted communications and programs, these tools may automatically scan your emails, video mails, instant messages, file attachments, and other files and communications. We do not use these tools for marketing or advertising.

HOW LONG WE KEEP YOUR INFORMATION

We keep your personal information for different lengths of time depending on the type of information and the business and legal requirements. For example, if you are a customer, we keep information that personally identifies you as long as you subscribe to one or more of our Services. If you no longer subscribe to a Service, we still may need that information for business and legal requirements, such as to protect against fraud, calculate taxes, or respond to legal requests. Other information is deleted automatically after a set period of time, often set by law, unless we are legally required to hold it longer, such as for pending litigation. We destroy, de-identify, or anonymize the information when it is no longer needed in identifiable form.

THE CHOICES YOU HAVE TO CONTROL OUR USE OF PERSONAL INFORMATION

You have many choices about how we communicate with you and how we use or share your information. You can manage these settings in the Xfinity Privacy Preferences Center (www.xfinity.com/privacy/manage-preference). If you change your mind, you can update your preferences anytime.

HOW TO ACCESS AND CORRECT THE INFORMATION IN OUR RECORDS

Part of our commitment to transparency includes giving our customers access to the personally identifiable information we have about them. If you subscribe to Xfinity Services, you have the ability to see and correct your personally identifiable information through the My Account, Xfinity Home, XClass TV, or other applicable account portals. If you are a California resident, you may have additional rights described in the "Special Information Regarding California Residents' Privacy Rights" section of this Privacy Policy.

If you subscribe to an Xfinity Service, you may correct or update information by visiting the My Account portal or by contacting us as described below. If you are an Xfinity Home customer, you can also correct or update your contact and emergency information in the Xfinity Home app. We will correct our records once we have verified that the changes you request are proper.

If you subscribe to Xfinity TV, Internet, or Voice services and would like to see your own personally identifiable information, other than your customer proprietary network information ("CPNI"), you may do so at your local Comcast office. To do so, please contact us by email at <u>Comcast_Privacy@comcast.com</u> or by phone at 1-800-XFINITY, giving us a reasonable period of time to locate and, if necessary, prepare the information for review, and to arrange an appointment during regular business hours. You will need to have proper identification and will only be able to see the personally identifiable information in your account and no other account.

If you make a written request for a copy of your Xfinity Voice or Mobile CPNI, we will provide you with the relevant information we have by mailing it to your account address, or to any person authorized by you, if we reasonably believe the request is valid. However, subscribers to our Xfinity Voice and Mobile Services should be aware that we generally do not provide them with records of any inbound or outbound calls or other records that we do not furnish in the ordinary course of business (for example, as part of a bill) or which are available only from our archives, without valid legal process such as a court order. In addition, we cannot correct any errors in customer names, addresses, or telephone numbers appearing in, or omitted from, our or our vendors' directory lists until the next available publication of those directory lists. Further, we may have no control over information appearing in the directory lists or directory assistance services of directory publishers or directory assistance providers that are not owned by us.

Comcast reserves the right to charge you for the reasonable cost of retrieving and photocopying any information or documents that you request, where permitted by law.

YOUR RIGHTS AND OUR LIMITATIONS UNDER FEDERAL LAWS

The federal Cable Act imposes limitations on our collection and sharing of information that personally identifies you when you subscribe to Services that use the facilities of the Comcast cable system. The Communications Act imposes restrictions on our use and sharing of CPNI when you use Services that are deemed telecommunications services.

The Cable Act and Personally Identifiable Information

This Privacy Policy is designed to comply with Section 631 of the Cable Communications Policy Act of 1984, as amended, (the "Cable Act"). The Cable Act permits Concast to use the cable system to collect personally identifiable information about you. Personally identifiable information is information that identifies you specifically; it does not include de-identified, anonymous, aggregate, or other data that does not identify you. We may collect personally identifiable information when it is necessary to render cable services or other services to you and to detect unauthorized reception or use of the services. We may use the cable system to collect personally identifiable information about you for additional purposes with your prior written or electronic consent. The Cable Act also permits Comcast to disclose personally identifiable information if the disclosure is necessary to render, or conduct a legitimate business activity related to, the cable service or other services provided to you; required by law or legal process; or limited to your name and address, subject to your opt-out consent. The frequency of any disclosure of personally identifiable information varies in accordance with our business needs and activities as described in this Policy.

If you believe that you have been aggrieved by any act of ours in violation of the Cable Act or other applicable laws, we encourage you to contact us directly at <u>Comcast_Privacy@</u> <u>comcast.com</u> in order to resolve your question or concern. You may also enforce the limitations imposed on us by the Cable Act as applicable with respect to your personally identifiable information through a civil lawsuit seeking damages, attorneys' fees, and litigation costs. Other rights and remedies may be available to you under federal or other applicable laws as well.

This Privacy Policy neither supersedes, enhances, nor modifies any arbitration agreement to which you may be bound as a subscriber to one or more of the Services.

The Communications Act and CPNI

Section 222 of the Communications Act of 1934, as amended (the "Communications Act"), provides additional privacy protections for information about the quantity, technical configuration, type, destination, location, and amount of your use of telecommunications services, including Xfinity Voice and Mobile Services, and the information about those services contained on your bills for those Services. This information is known as customer proprietary network information or "CPNI." CPNI does not include your name, address, or telephone number, which is defined by the Communications Act as "subscriber list information." However, that information is otherwise considered personally identifiable information.

If you are a customer of Xfinity Voice or Mobile Service, or another Service that is subject to these requirements, you have the right, and Comcast has a duty, under the Communications Act and other applicable laws, to protect the confidentiality of your CPNI. In addition, the FCC's rules provide additional privacy protections and choices regarding use and sharing that are specific to our Voice and Mobile service that we describe in this Policy.

SPECIAL INFORMATION REGARDING CALIFORNIA RESIDENTS' PRIVACY RIGHTS

The California Consumer Privacy Act of 2018 ("CCPA") provides California residents with rights to receive certain disclosures regarding the collection, use, and sharing of "Personal Information," as well as rights to access, delete, and restrict the sale of certain Personal Information we collect about them. You or your authorized agent may submit a request to exercise these rights by visiting https://www.xfinity.com/privacy/requests or calling us at 1-844-963-0138. The CCPA defines "Personal Information" to mean "information that identifies, relates to, describes, is capable of being associated with, or could reasonably be linked, directly or indirectly, with a particular consumer or household." If you are a California resident, you have a right not to receive discriminatory treatment for the exercise of the privacy rights conferred by the CCPA.

Residents of the State of California also have the right to request information regarding third parties to whom the company has disclosed certain categories of personal information during the preceding year for the third parties' direct marketing purposes under California's "Shine the Light" law (Cal. Civ. Code §1798.83). Personal information under this California law means "any information that when it was disclosed identified, described, or was able to be associated with an individual." We do not disclose this type of personal information to third parties for their own purposes and we permit you to opt out of any disclosures of non-identifiable personal information. Collection and Use of Personal Information

The general section of this Privacy Policy describes the types of personal information we collect, how we collect it, and how we use it in categories that are easy to understand. The CCPA requires us to disclose the personal information we have collected about consumers in the past 12 months in the following categories. Some of the categories include very

Right to Know and Right to Request Deletion of Information

There may be information we will not return in response to your access request, such as information that would affect the privacy of others or interfere with legal requirements. Similarly, there may be reasons why we cannot comply with your deletion request, such as the need to keep your personal information to provide you service or to fulfill a legal obligation.

Right to Information Regarding Participation in Data Sharing for Financial Incentives

We may run promotions from time to time and ask you to share personal information with us in exchange for discounts. For example, we may offer a one-time discount if consumers sign up for our email marketing list. We will always give you clear notices about these types of programs when you sign up, and participation is always voluntary. If you change your mind, you will always be able to opt out, and if you don't participate, you will still be able to use our Services.

SPECIAL INFORMATION REGARDING MAINE RESIDENTS' PRIVACY RIGHTS

Maine's Broadband Internet Access Service Customer Privacy Act generally prohibits providers of broadband Internet access service ("Providers") from using, disclosing, selling or permitting access to "customer personal information" without a customer's express, affirmative consent, which may be revoked at any time.

However, no consent is required for the collection, retention, use, disclosure, or sale or access to customer personal information when such activities are required to:

A Provider shall take reasonable measures to protect customer personal information from unauthorized use, disclosure or access, taking into account the nature and scope of the Provider's activities, the sensitivity of the data the provider collects, the size of the Provider, and the technical feasibility of the security measures.

In addition, a Provider may use, disclose, sell, or permit access to non-CPI, unless the customer opts out.

Below you can find illustrative examples and more information about the terms used in the policy that have ① next to them.

Personal Information: Includes any information that is linked or reasonably linkable to you or your household.

Xfinity products, services, networks and platforms: This includes the Xfinity-branded products and services and other Comcast services that link to this Privacy Policy, including: Xfinity® TV & Streaming, Xfinity Internet, xFi and Xfinity Advanced Security, Xfinity Voice, Xfinity Stream app, Xfinity Wi-Fi service, Xfinity Home, Xfinity Mobile, Xfinity Flex.

Comcast-branded products and services: This includes Comcast services such as Effectv, Comcast Business Services, and XClass TV, which are part of Comcast Cable. **Third parties:** Third parties are other companies that collect or maintain information about you and share it with us, such as credit bureaus who share information with us when you

sign up for service and consent to a credit check.

Respond to your requests: In order to provide better customer service, we keep track of when you contacted us, what the issue was and what is the best way to get in contact with you.

Tailor our services: We collect data from third parties to better understand your interests and provide personalized offers.

Photographs: We may take a picture of your porch or doorstep with the equipment we deliver to you or aerial photographs of our network to assess network safety and compliance. Video selection and viewing activity: When you use the video services we provide, such as Xfinity TV, Xfinity Stream App, and XClass TV, we know what video selection you made in order to deliver it to you. When you access content from third-party applications on the X1 or Flex or XClass TV, we will only know those video selections when you and/or your provider have allowed the sharing of this information.

To help us authenticate you: Some of our services can only be provided in certain geographic areas and require us to know that you are physically located at your service address in order to use them or access information.

Third-party services that you integrate with or connect to through our Services: For example, if you download or use another company's tools or features that are compatible with our Services, that other company will collect information about your use of those tools and features.

DNS: The address book of the Internet is known as DNS, or Domain Name System. It's how people navigate the Internet. Millions of Comcast customers look up billions of addresses online every day. We delete the DNS queries generated by our Internet customers every 24 hours except in very specific cases where we need to research a security or network performance issue, protect against security threats, or comply with a valid legal request. You may decide to keep that information in your account longer when you enable certain features, such as our advanced security services that allow you to see the websites that are blocked for up to 30 days. But we've never used that data for any sort of marketing or advertising – and we have never sold it to anyone.

Network traffic activity: Where you go on the Internet is your business, not ours. We de-identify our customer's network traffic activity within 24 hours and then only use that de-identified information to study our network data to assess how the network is performing, understand trends, stay ahead of capacity demands, and build, test, and improve our products and services. We do that with only a small sample of network data that is aggregated and never identifiable to any customer.

Xfinity Mobile: We don't sell, and have never sold, your location data when you use our Xfinity Mobile service.

Mobile apps: If you are using a mobile device to access our Services, we may need to know the location of your mobile device or other device in which you have installed one of our applications for certain functionality, such as connecting you to a nearby Xfinity WiFi Hotspot. We will request your consent to collect and use precise geolocation information before we do so. You can prohibit the collection of this information through your device's settings (see "Your Choices") but doing so may limit certain functions and features of our Services.

Demographic: Information like gender, age, and census records.

Interest: Information that indicates your interest in things like sports, travel, or cooking.

Purchase: Information from loyalty program or public records.

Facebook: If you interact with our Services on a device through which you also interact with social networks or if you interact with us through a social media function such as a plugin (for example, a Facebook "like" button) then you may be permitting us to have on-going access to some information from your social network profile (such as your name, email address, your friend list, photo, age, gender, location, birthday, social networking ID, current city, the people/sites you follow, and so forth). If you don't want a social network to collect the information about you as described above, or you don't want a social network to share it with us and other third parties, please review the privacy settings and instructions of the applicable social network before you interact with our Services.

Measurement and analytics reports for us and others: We and service providers who work on our behalf may combine and use data from our business records – including account information, video activity data, and other usage data – with data from third parties to create measurement and analytics reports. These reports are de-identified or aggregated and do not contain any information that personally identifies you.

We use these reports for many of the purposes described in the Privacy Policy, such as for improving the Services, creating and delivering more personalized advertising on behalf of Comcast and other third parties, determining whether and how an advertiser's messages are viewed, and analyzing the effectiveness of certain advertisements on the Comcast Services and other platforms and services. We also use these reports to work with academic or research groups, and for other uses that help us develop and fund improvements in services and infrastructure. We may share these reports with programmers, advertisers, or others. Opt-in or opt-out settings: For example, if we share personal information that does not personally identify you with others for their own use, we will first give you the choice to opt

In other instances, you may want us to share your name, physical address, or email address with another company, such as when you are signing up for a thirdparty service through one of our platforms, such as the X1, Flex, or XClass TV. In that instance, we will make sure you give us clear direction to do so, before we pass that information on.

Identifies you: We may share de-identified or aggregate information that in no way identifies you with third parties when those third parties commit to not re-identify that information or share it with others who may attempt to do so, including for academic and other research.

Information that personally identifies you: Personally identifiable information includes things like your name, phone number, physical address, or email address.

Another company: For example, when you are signing up for a third-party service through our X1 or Flex, you may ask us to share contact information to help you register or log on. Or if you were interested in a product you saw advertised on television and wanted to share your contact information so that the product provider could send you more information, we might present that option to you.

Non-Xfinity video app: For example, when you use Peacock on the X1, Flex, or XClass platform.

Another company's platform or device: For example, when you use the Xfinity Stream app from devices operated by other companies, such as an Apple or Android device. Vary: For example, the CCPA puts name and social security number in the same category. We may use your name to send you marketing materials for our products, but we will not

use your Social Security Number for marketing or advertising.

Customer personal information: (1) Personally identifying information about a broadband customer, including but not limited to the customer's name, billing information, social security number, billing address and demographic data; and (2) Information from a customer's use of broadband Internet access service.



On April 11, 2023, the following channels, where offered, will no longer be available on the Digital Preferred Tier and can be found on the following tiers listed: Aspire HD on Expanded Basic and Entertainment; GSN (Game Show Network) on Expanded Basic and Entertainment; Revolt HD on Expanded Basic and Entertainment; Tennis Channel on Expanded Basic and Sports & News; Travel Channel on Expanded Basic and Entertainment; and TV Land on Expanded Basic and Entertainment. Aspire HD and Revolt HD require X1 TV Box or compatible customer owned device. HD Technology Fee required to receive HD channels.

On April 11, 2023, the following channel changes will occur: INSP HD will no longer be available on Kids & Family, will move from channel 1655 to channel 1431 on Expanded Basic, and will be added to Entertainment channel 1431; INSP SD will no longer be available on Kids & Family and will be added to Entertainment channel 83; Great American Family will move from channel 1620 to channel 1461 remaining on Expanded Basic and Entertainment. Requires X1 TV Box or compatible customer owned device. HD Technology Fee required to receive HD channels.




