## ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

(Meeting convened at 7:00 p.m.)
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Good evening, Bourne. Having reached the date and hour designated in the Warrant for the May 1, 2023, Annual Town Meeting, I, hereby, call the meeting to order. My name is Amy Kullar, and I am the Bourne Town Meeting Moderator.

Mr. Town Clerk, Barry Johnson, how many voters have been checked into the Town Meeting?

CLERK BARRY JOHNSON: Two hundred and seventy-six.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: He responds 276 registered voters. I declare there is a quorum present.

Mr. Town Clerk, has the Annual Town Meeting Warrant been duly posted as required by law?

CLERK BARRY JOHNSON: It has.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: He responds in the affirmative. Madam Stenographer, please note for the record that the Town

Clerk responds that the Warrant has been duly posted.

Please, everyone, silence your cell phones. And at this time, I'd ask you to stand and remain standing until I ask you to resume your seats and join me in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance.
(Pledge Of Allegiance.)
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Let us offer a special moment of silence to those brave men and women who serve our nation in the public safety, military, and intelligence services at home and abroad, and for those town employees who have passed away since the last Town Meeting.
(Moment of silence.)
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you. You may be seated.

I recognize Peter Meier.
SELECT BOARD CHAIR PETER MEIER:
Madam Moderator, I recognize -- Madam Moderator, I introduce you -- let's start again. Point of personal privilege, Madam Moderator.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Welcome. SELECT BOARD CHAIR PETER MEIER: Thank you. Madam Moderator, I want to introduce you and the Town Meeting to the newly elected Sheriff of Barnstable County. Sheriff Donna Buckley is here with us tonight. She is at the podium to say hello to the Town Meeting.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Welcome, Sheriff Buckley to the Bourne Annual Town Meeting.

SHERIFF DONNA BUCKLEY: Thank you, Madam Moderator. Thank you to the Bourne Town Meeting. This is still an exercise in democracy in its purest form. I am excited to be here. I just want to take a minute to introduce myself and let you know that even though I live in Falmouth, I work in Bourne, the home of our Barnstable County Sheriff's office.

In addition to running our
correctional facility and doing the work to keep all of Barnstable County safe, our sheriff's office works closely with your

Bourne Fire Department, with regard to emergency communication service. We work closely with the Bourne Police Department as part of the Cape Cod Regional Law Enforcement Council, and we are also your partners in the Upper Cape Regional Water Supply Cooperative.

With about 300 employees, we are keenly aware of the traffic challenges that are presented by the bridges, and I want you to know from me that we will be partners with the Town of Bourne as we advocate for the best way to handle the new bridge construction.

So, please, consider us at the Sheriff's office as your neighbors. You're welcome any time to come visit and have a great Town Meeting. Thank you. MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you, Sheriff Buckley.

THE AUDIENCE: (Applause.)
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Yes, Peter.
SELECT BOARD CHAIR PETER MEIER:
Yes, I have one more point of personal

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: You may go ahead.

SELECT BOARD CHAIR PETER MEIER:

Thank you. This evening will be Judith
Froman's last Town Meeting as a member of the Select Board. Judith's been an excellent member and a mentor and a friend for six-plus years on this Board and also serving on the School Committee.

Judith also has been an Upper-Cape CCMPO rep, and she advocates for the residents of this community. It's a happy day but a sad day because, you know, she's leaving on her own. It was her decision not to run again, but she will surely -- sorely be missed. And I just feel that we should recognize her here at Town Meeting for all the great work she's done over her time here with the Town of Bourne.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you, Peter. Thank you, Judith. Thank you, Judy. THE AUDIENCE: (Applause.) MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: And I also

have a point of personal privilege. I would like to recognize Dr. William Towne. This is his last Town Meeting as a member of the Finance Committee, and I would like to thank him for his many years of service to the Town of Bourne.

THE AUDIENCE: (Applause.)
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: All right. So we made it through that part. What's going to happen now is I'm going to talk for quite a few more minutes. I'm going to provide you lots of information. We're going to go over some housekeeping matters and vote on two motions that will move Town Meeting business along more smoothly.

You, all, should have electronic voting devices. These votes that we are going to take before we get to the articles are going to be voice votes, okay? That's how straightforward they are. So, please, bear with me and don't make me count your votes during the next couple of minutes. Thank you. All right.

So, moving forward with the

business of this Town Meeting. Later on, in about 20 minutes, I'm going to call for a motion to recess the Annual Town Meeting approximately as close to $7: 30$ as we can get. And we will then convene the Special Town Meeting. After the Special Town Meeting business is concluded, we will return to the Annual Town Meeting. Okay. All right.

I have appointed Wendy Weston as my Deputy Moderator. Wendy is seated down in front of the stage right to my left and your right. If you need help with a motion or any other matter, please see Wendy. Okay.

Seated in front of you on the stage on my right, your left, facing the stage, we have the Finance Committee; we have the Deputy Town Clerk, the Town Clerk, Town Counsel, the Board of Selectmen; the Town Administrator is behind me, and the person that brings us the electronic voting is next to her. Everyone else that might speak tonight, I have the Town staff are

sitting in seats that have been reserved for
them to my left in the first few rows.
Okay.

Does everyone have a Voter Handbook?

THE AUDIENCE: Yes.
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: If not, please raise your hand and a teller will bring you one.

Now, does every registered voter have an electronic voting device? If not, please raise your hand and a teller will bring you one. We're going to take two minutes to go over the electronic voting system.

So when you were checked in, you were given a handset, that handset is for voting, and it is issued to you and only you. Using a handset issued to someone else is strictly forbidden.

Before each vote, I will name the article by number, and you will know which page in your handbook to turn to. I will tell you which page it's on. I'll then

announce the beginning of a 30 -second interval during which you will vote on your handset. To vote "Yes," you will press the green button. To vote "No," you will press the red button. If you accidentally push the wrong button, you can switch your vote by pushing the correct button. If you don't want to participate in a vote, don't push any buttons. When the 30 -second voting interval is over, I will announce that voting is complete. Shortly thereafter, I will announce the results of the vote.

Now, if you temporarily leave your
seat and exit the auditorium, please leave your handset with the exit desk staff at the rear of the auditorium. They will label your handset with your name and reissue it when you return to the auditorium. When leaving the auditorium at the conclusion of business this evening, please make sure to place your handset in one of the bins at the exit desk. Okay.

Now, we're going to do a practice vote to make sure that everyone here is

comfortable with operating their handset. Remember, it's green for "Yes" and red for "No."

The first question tonight is an easy question. I'm going to ask the Town of Bourne will the Celtics win the NBA championship this season? I was going to do Bruins, but we know how that worked out.

THE AUDIENCE: (Laughter.)
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: All right.
So, you can begin voting now. Green for
"Yes"; red for "No."
(Voting in progress.)
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: All right.
Voting is closed.
I declare that the Celtics will win the championship with 266 votes.

THE AUDIENCE: (Applause.)
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: All right.

We're off to a good start.
Okay. I am informed by the Board of Selectmen that if this Town Meeting does not conclude this evening, that it is their intention to move that it recess and

reconvene tomorrow evening here at 7 p.m. We'll do our best.

The Town Meeting is governed by Robert's Rules of Order as interpreted by the book Town Meeting Time. I will not be reading all of the Moderator's rules which are detailed beginning on page 4 in your Voter Handbook. I will address parliamentary matters as they arise during the course of the meeting.

When an article is called, and you
intend to speak on that article, please leave your seat and come down to the front if there's any seats available and sit near one of the two microphones so that I may recognize you.

Generally, you will have up to three-and-a-half minutes to speak. I reserve the right to change the amount of time allotted if we have a lot of interest in speaking on certain articles so that everyone can be heard. Okay. My deputy is keeping time for me.

One thing I do not tolerate during

Town Meeting are personal attacks or any other kind of behavior in that nature from a Speaker. You will be declared out of order. And in accordance with Massachusetts law, you may be removed from the meeting by the Sergeant at arms and confined until the conclusion of the session. Please speak only to the motion on the floor. Do not be repetitive, be concise, and to the point. This meeting is being videotaped for televising on the local Comcast cable access channel. As a matter of long-time custom and usage within the Town of Bourne, it is solely within the Moderator's discretion to allow nonvoters to address the Town Meeting. If anything tonight interferes with your ability to hear, speak, or participate in the Town Meeting to your satisfaction, you may interrupt the meeting by declaring a point of personal privilege, and your concern will be heard and addressed. If you need to speak from your seat, please get my attention or Wendy's attention, and we will try to get a portable

microphone over to you. Okay?
Now we're going to conduct two votes by voice. All right. So, I will entertain a motion now that this meeting dispense with the reading of the Warrant and of the Constable's return of service of that warrant, and that the Moderator not be required to read Resolutions or Warrant articles verbatim but may, instead, refer to them by article number and/or page in the handbook.

SELECT BOARD CHAIR PETER MEIER:

So moved.
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: I have a motion from Peter Meier.

MS. MELISSA FERRETTI: Second.
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: I have a second from Melissa Ferretti.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: All right.

All those in favor, Town Meeting, of dispensing with the reading of the Warrant, please indicate by saying "Aye."

THE AUDIENCE: Aye.
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: All those

opposed? Thank you. I declare the vote is unanimous.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: I am
informed by the Board of Selectmen that there is a Bourne Rule Resolution. This Resolution is printed in your handbook. Mr.

Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, please make a motion on the Proposition $2-1 / 2$ resolution.

SELECT BOARD CHAIR PETER MEIER:
Motion to waive the reading of the Bourne Rule.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Motion to waive the reading of the Bourne Rule. SELECT BOARD JARED MACDONALD: Second.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: I have a second from Jared MacDonald. All those in favor of waiving the reading of the Bourne Rule, please say, "Aye."

THE AUDIENCE: Aye.
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Opposed? I
declare it is unanimous.

 (Motion carried.)MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: This next question is directed at the Finance Committee chair and Board of Selectmen chair, if all of the recommended articles in the Annual Town Meeting that require raising and appropriating of funds are passed, will the Town be at their maximum levy limit? SELECT BOARD CHAIR PETER MEIER: Yes.

MS. AMANDA BONGIOVANNI: Yes. MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: They respond in the affirmative. Okay. Lastly, I am informed by the Town Administrator in accordance with Section 1.1.9 of the Town Bylaws that there are articles which the Selectmen and the Finance Committee have each voted are essential to the exercise of the Town's corporate functions. These Article are 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 9, 10, and 12. All other articles of this Annual Town Meeting will be drawn by lottery after we go through those articles in order. And with that, we will now move to

## ARTICLE 1

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Article 1 on page 25 of your handbook requires a majority vote. Does the Select Board have a positive motion Article $1 ?$

SELECT BOARD CHAIR PETER MEIER: Yes, we do.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: I recognize Peter Meier.

SELECT BOARD CHAIR PETER MEIER:

Yes. We move that the Town vote to approve the use of the consent agenda including each of the articles set forth in the Warrant in Article 1, and, further, that the Town vote to approve Article 1 as set forth in the Warrant, and further that (A) With respect to Article $1-4$ to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 350,000$ for the Finance Committee Reserve Fund, and (B) With respect to Article $1-6$ to transfer 100,000 from Free Cash to fund costs related to payments for accrued Contractual Compensated Absences. SELECT BOARD JARED MACDONALD:

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Mr. Meier, you have the floor.

SELECT BOARD CHAIR PETER MEIER:
The items listed in the consent agenda reoccur annually and are housekeeping in nature.

A "Yes" or "Aye" vote in favor of the motion would approve all the consent articles at one time and authorize a cost-of-living allowance, COLA, increase of $2-1 / 2$ percent for the Town Clerk. All other salaries for Elected Officials, the Reserve Fund, Revolving Fund Spending Limits, and funding for Accrued Contractual Compensated Absences will remain the same as the prior fiscal year.

A "No" or "Nay" vote opposed to the motion would mean that Town Meeting would vote on the items individually.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you. And does the Finance Committee have a recommendation on this article?

MR. TOM JOYCE: We do.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: I recognize Thomas Joyce.

MR. THOMAS JOYCE: The Finance Committee voted unanimously 9-0-0 to recommend approval of this article. This is a standard annual article that committee members understand the mechanics of and no questions or concerns were raised during discussion.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you. Is there any further discussion on Article 1? Seeing none. We will move to a vote on Article 1. This vote requires a majority vote. Does everyone have their handheld devices? When I say, "Voting is open," you will have 30 seconds to cast your vote. Green for "Yes"; red for "No." You may begin voting now.
(Voting in progress.)

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Voting is now closed.

I declare the motion of the Select Board has passed with 367 in favor and 37 in opposition.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: We'll move to Article 2. Article 2 on page 28 of your handbook requires a two-thirds majority vote. Does the Select Board have a positive motion?

MS. MARY MASTRANGELO: Yes, we do.
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: I recognize
Mary Jane Mastrangelo.
MS. MARY MASTRANGELO: We move
that the sum of $\$ 77,187,218$ be hereby appropriated from the funding sources listed below to defray the expenses of the Municipal Town Departments in the chart entitled, "These Amounts are to be Voted" as shown below for the fiscal year starting July 1, 2023, to and including June 30, 2024. MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you. We have a second from Peter Meier. Does the Finance Committee have a positive recommendation on this -- oh no. Sorry. You have the floor.

MS. MARY MASTRANGELO: Can I do an explanation?

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: I apologize.

SELECTPERSON MARY JANE
MASTRANGELO: That's okay.
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: New method.
SELECTPERSON MARY JANE
MASTRANGELO: Okay. Before I start the explanation on the budget, if you've noticed, we're doing Town Meeting a little
bit different this year. So the Finance Committee voted in February that they did not want to make the motions for the articles anymore or the explanations. They just wanted to give their explanation. So the Select Board has taken over the role of making the motions and the explanations. And after the Select Board motion and explanation, the Finance Committee will be giving their recommendation.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you, MJ .

SELECTPERSON MARY JANE

MASTRANGELO: This is the annual article funding the Operating Budget of the Town and Schools. The estimated General Fund Revenues available for the Operating Budget increased 3.33 percent. The proposed budget is shown in Appendix $B$ on pages 77 to 89 of the Voter Handbook.

This is a level-service budget
that maintains the services provided in the current budget. The total bottom line increase of the proposed General Fund

Operating Budget is 4.55 percent over the current Operating Budget.

There are no new staff positions or additional personnel in the proposed budget. Most of the increase is due to contractual increases for both employees and contracted services. There are two new initiatives proposed, a small library of things included in the Library budget, and a migration of all employee email and Microsoft Office licenses to the Cloud and Office 365 service.

Appendix B on page 73 shows the Sources of Funds, and page 74 shows the Expenditures. It is worth noting that there is no Free Cash used to balance the budget, and our reserves are maintained in accordance with our financial policy.

The Capital Stabilization Reserve Fund which is utilized as a revenue source to pay about $\$ 1.1$ million of the Debt Service expense is being maintained at a level to cover 3 to 5 years of debt service. The long-term plan projections are in

Appendix B on pages 96 to 97 of the Voter Handbook. Based on the Estimated Revenue and Expenditures, total Reserves are maintained at 14 to 17 percent of the budget over the next five years. And based on the proposed budget and current service levels, there should not be a need for an override for at least five years. These projections could change if economic conditions change, and the continued monitoring of the longterm plan is important.

A "Yes" or "Aye" vote in favor of the motion would approve the General Fund Operating Budget for FY24 from July 1, 2023, through June 30, 2024.

A "No" or "Nay" vote opposed to the motion would mean that there would be no approved Operating Budget for FY24, and the Town could not function properly.

The Select Board voted unanimously 5-0-0 to recommend approval of this article.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you. Does the Finance Committee have a recommendation?

MS. AMANDA BONGIOVANNI: We do, Madam Moderator. The Finance Committee voted unanimously $9-0-0$ to recommend approval of this article. The committee examined individual department budgets as part of our annual process budget review. Nothing alarming was proposed, and all salary increases were contractual with no positions added this coming fiscal year. The Department heads and the Town Administrator adequately answered all questions and provided clarifications. MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you. Is there any further discussion on Article 2? Seeing none. We'll move to a vote on Article 2. Now, this vote requires a twothirds majority vote. So, we're going to do math. All right. Does everyone have their handheld device? THE AUDIENCE: Yes. MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: When I tell you, you will have 30 seconds to cast your vote. Green for "Yes"; red for "No." Article 2, two-thirds majority. You may

I declare the motion of the select Board is passed with 414 in favor and 29 opposed.
(Article 2 passed.)
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: We're just two minutes outside of 7:30, and we're going to head over to the Special Town Meeting. So, I would entertain a motion at this time to recess the Annual Town Meeting.

So moved.
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: I have a motion.

SELECT BOARD JARED MACDONALD:
Second.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: And a
second. This is a voice vote. All those in favor of recessing the Annual Town Meeting, please indicate by saying "Aye."

THE AUDIENCE: Aye.

CLERK BARRY JOHNSON: Four fortytwo.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Mr. Town Clerk, how many voters have checked into this Special Town Meeting?

CLERK BARRY JOHNSON: Four hundred and forty-two.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: He responds
442. I declare there is a quorum present.

Mr. Town Clerk, has the Special
Town Meeting Warrant been duly signed and posted as required by law?

MR. BARRY JOHNSON: It has.
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: He responds that it has.

Sorry. Currently located at the Cumberland Farms property at the Bourne Rotary, an eight-month demolition delay was placed on the 1929 structure in January 2023 by the Historic Commission.

Since then, the VFW expressed interest in the ownership of the structure and filed a Community Preservation Application to fund, 1., The relocation to a privately-owned parcel located at 180 Shore Road; and 2., The necessary historical renovations needed to use the facility as a nonprofit thrift shop.
A "Yes" or "Aye" vote in favor of

this motion would allow CPA funds to be used to move the structure to 180 Shore Road, and to make necessary repairs and renovations for use as a nonprofit associated thrift shop.

A "No" or "Nay" vote opposed to the motion would provide no CPA funds to relocate the structure before the demolition delay expires.

MR. WILLIAM DOHERTY: My name is Bill Doherty; I live in Cataumet. I'm opposed to this article for the following reasons. When they describe the amount of work that had to be done in order to make it suitable for a thrift shop, it seemed to me that instead of spending $\$ 45,000$ to move this shack over to the VFW, they could build or put a shed -- it would probably cost them between six and $\$ 10,000$ to do the very same thing. I would point out that the Supported Veterans in this area is covered by two things. There is a food pantry, which I participate in down in Falmouth at the AMVETS; there's, also, at the old Sandwich

Police Station essentially a surplus food outlet that is designed to help veterans with both food insecurity issues and also to help younger veterans and younger soldiers with things that they need like baby diapers and things like that.

Because of the presence of what $I$ would consider an adequate support for these kinds of issues, $I$ believe that spending $\$ 45,000$ to move it to the VFW, and they've already said the amount of work that has to be done would, essentially, make it a new place anyway.

So with that in mind, I think that, you know, we'll talk about the Keene House later, which I think is worthy of support, but this I don't believe is. Thank you.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you, Mr. Doherty. Is there any further discussion on Article 4? If you'd like to be heard, please come to the podium.

MR. CHUCK ROTH: My name is Chuck Roth, 73 Lake Drive. I'm here to propose

approval of this motion for a few reasons. One is the amount of work to renovate a historical structure, yes, sometimes can be costly and time-consuming; however, it is a historical structure. It's been pretty much deemed so by the Historical Commission.

And we at the VFW -- I'm the post commander there, by the way, we, at the VFW, are seeking to expand our community outreach, our community engagement, and this is one of the measures that we have chosen to do so. We have many events at the post, and we have a lot of veterans that need things other than food, and this is not going to have food. This is going to be a thrift shop where veterans can come in, and whatever they need as far as clothing, whatever items we have in the shop, will be theirs for the taking. Everybody else will pay a nominal fee.

We are seeking this booth to also enhance our own property, and because we don't have the money to build a new shed, as you call it. It's not a shed; it's an

information booth. It was 40, 50, 60-years ago, 70-years ago and it still is. It's a very sound building. The interior just needs updating on the electrical. The exterior needs a few shingles here and there. The move is the big thing, and we would like to keep our presence in the community on a positive note and not a negative one. There's a lot of people that have not a very good opinion of the VFW or any military organization like that. So we want to make something a little more positive for the people of Bourne. Thank you.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you. MR. GARY MALONEY: Madam

Moderator, Gary Maloney in Buzzards Bay. MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Yes. MR. GARY MALONEY: Mine is just a procedural question.

I declare the motion of the Select Board is passed with 375 in favor and 91 opposed.
(Article 1 passed.)

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Article 7. We're going to keep decorum during this article too, please. Please. Thank you.

Article 7 on page 15 of your handbook requires a simple majority vote. Does the Select Board have a positive motion?

SELECT BOARD CHAIR PETER MEIER: No, Madam Chair.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: The Select Board does not have a positive motion.

Does the Finance Committee have a recommendation on this article?

MS. AMANDA BONGIOVANNI: We do, but we don't have a positive motion.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Okay.
Thank you.

MS. AMANDA BONGIOVANNI: You're welcome.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Does anyone have a positive motion to make on Article 7?

MR. STEPHEN STROJNY: I do.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: I recognize Stephen Strojny.

MR. STEPHEN STROJNY: We move that the Town vote to approve this article as set forth in the Warrant.

MALE VOICE: Second.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: All right.
I see a second. Thank you. Mr. Strojny, you have the floor.

MR. STEPHEN STROJNY: Thank you, very much. Folks, I'm Steve Strojny. I'm a former member of the Planning Board, and I was chairman for a number of years. I'm here advocating for the repeal of the ban of cannabis in the Town of Bourne.

Sales of cannabis in the state of Massachusetts, since it went legal, have exceeded \$4 billion. They're fast approaching $\$ 5$ billion. Taxes for cannabis

that sold through legal dispensaries is 20 percent, 3 percent of that goes to the local community, 17 percent of that goes to the state. So we are fast approaching \$1 billion in tax revenue from legal marijuana here in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. That's one point.

And I understand that this is an issue that there's a lot of interest in, but what $I$ think we can all agree on is there are a couple of things that really matter here. One of them is children. We want to make sure that children don't get this product. And what I want to do is explain to you how the dispensary system works. When you go to buy a marijuana product, from the time that product is a seed to grow into a plant, it's processed into a product, ends up in the dispensary, it is tracked on that whole process. It is independently tested for purity and content.

When a person goes to a dispensary, they have to give their driver's license; they have to identify themselves.

They're allowed to buy a certain amount of product on a daily basis. That product is scanned in. Now if that product gets diverted to a child, they're going to know exactly where that product was bought and who it was sold to. It's going to help avoid the diversion of this product.

The other thing that's really
important to me is the black market. The black-market, when cannabis became legal in the Commonwealth of Mass., was about a fourth the cost. In other words, if you went to a dispensary, you were going to pay four times as much in the dispensary as you would in the black-market. So the black market was still thriving initially. Well, because there's so much more product that has come online in Massachusetts from Massachusetts farms and growers, the price of black-market marijuana and dispensary marijuana is just about neck and neck at this point. The black-market has to bring it in from Mexico or California. They have to ship it across the country illegally.

And of that $\$ 4$ billion of sales that has happened in Massachusetts, the vast majority of that would've went to the black-market, and there would've been no benefit to the community. The people who are in the black market are drug dealers, they're criminals, and we need to put them out of business, and this is a step in that direction. Massachusetts has heavily regulated cannabis, and they've done it right. They've learned from the mistakes out in California and Colorado and, most recently, in New York, and it's a very highly regulated industry, and the black market cannot thrive. People say, well, teenagers will still buy it on the black market; won't they? The black market cannot thrive and survive on teenagers. It's just not going to happen. To me, it's why we don't have a black-market in alcohol because it can't survive.

Folks, I've heard a lot of things about people abusing cannabis, and people will abuse it. There are some people that

will abuse it, just like there are some people that will abuse alcohol. There are some people that are compulsive gamblers. There are people, like, that eat too much. So they will abuse it.

But I think you need to know that the vast majority of cannabis uses, many of them are in this room tonight, the vast majority use it in a very responsible way, and they use it for their therapeutic values.

One of the turning points in my whole thought process on this was a number of years ago, a very dear friend of mine, his son was injured in Iraq, and he was near an IED and it exploded. Well, he went to the Army doctors to treat these migraines and insomnia, and when he got back here -MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Mr.

Strojny, you're at five minutes.
MR. STEPHEN STROJNY: Okay. Well, I'll finish with this. Folks, tonight, just vote the facts. Don't vote the scare tactics. Listen to what people have to say,

and however you vote this evening, however anybody votes, please respect the vote and the person.

Thank you, very much.
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you.
So, we're going to -- no. We're going to have some discussion on this article. I'm interested in hearing alternating between the folks in favor and folks against. Mr. Strojny, as the motion maker, is, obviously, in favor. I'm going to ask you, are you in favor?

MR. GEORGE SEAVER: No. I'm opposed.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: All right. Please go ahead. Please identify yourself. I'm limiting the comments on this since we have double-digit people in line to two minutes per speaker. Thank you.

MR. GEORGE SEAVER: I'm George Seaver; I'm from Cataumet. And by the way on my way into this meeting, I saw a big sign that says, "Don't smoke anywhere near here," and I'm in favor of that.

But what I really want to say is that in a recent story in the Enterprise, the former DA and former Sheriff, and Dr. Bosco from Cape Cod Hospital Emergency Room stated that their experience in their job showed that marijuana was a gateway drug to heroin. These are professional people, and they weren't giving their opinion; they were giving what they observed on their job. Thank you.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you. Please.

MS. LORI HOUGH: Good evening.
Lori Hough, Monument Beach. I have been a resident of Bourne for 30 years since I married my husband, Kevin. For those of you who know me, you would know that my family and community are two things that are very important to me. In those 30 years, I have raised a son, Griffin, and helped out with many extracurricular activities around the Town that comes with raising a teenager. I also started several businesses that are located here in Bourne and have been in

operation for over 20 years.
I, recently, opened Capeway
Cannabis with my sister-in-law Michelle. We operate a retail store in Carver, Massachusetts. I am, also, one of the petitioners of this article. I can tell that if I thought there was any negative effects with the sale of cannabis, I would've never brought it to our Town.

While recently renewing our license with the state, we received a letter from the Carver Town Administrator stating that no outstanding issues or cost to the Town of Carver has been related to the operation of our business. While working in our Carver store, $I$ do see a good amount of Bourne residents, many of which are there to get help with ailments, whether it's with sleep or pain. Our store has brought over 25 good jobs with benefits to Carver with many of those jobs going to the residents of Carver.

With the proposed three stores in Bourne, that could mean 50 to 75 good paying

jobs. In Carver, we work with the local food pantry and many other charitable groups making donations and volunteering. We are a company that cares about the communities we work in and in giving back, and we'd certainly continue down this path with Bourne.

I believe there are many financial reasons that are good for the Town of Bourne, but most of all, $I$ believe the sale of cannabis is not detrimental to our community.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you. That's two minutes. Thank you, very much.

MS. LORI HOUGH: Thank you.
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you. MR. ELMER CLEGG: Thank you, Madam Moderator. Good evening. I'm Elmer Clegg, and I live in Pocasset. I'm not a marijuana user, but I am tolerant of friends who choose to use it.

I oppose Article 7 for one important reason. The only way to protect this Town and provide a safe environment for

our families is to vote no on 7 and here's why.

The proposed Zoning Bylaw, Article
8, is a 100 percent win for developers.
Article 8 would make our town all in --

MR. STEPHEN STROJNY: We're not on Article 8.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Hey, you're out of order. Thank you. Nope.

MR. STEPHEN STROJNY: Point of order. We're not talking about Article 8; we're on Article 7.

MR. ELMER CLEGG: I'm talking about article -- I'm voting against Article 7 because of the construct of Article 8.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: I will allow it.

MR. ELMER CLEGG: I hope that doesn't count against my time, Madam Moderator?

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: It does not.

MR. ELMER CLEGG: Thank you, very much. The proposed Zoning Bylaw, Article 8,
is a 100 percent win for developers. Article 8 would make our Town all in on marijuana, much like Wareham. Bourne sits in a unique position. We're bounded on the south by Falmouth, which has a complete ban on marijuana. We're bounded to the west by Wareham which welcomes all types of marijuana, and we're bounded off to the east by Sandwich. Sandwich has tightly controlled Bylaws limiting marijuana to one medical dispensary with a co-located recreational marijuana retail outlet. Sandwich limits the location of that single operation to a small overlay zone within the medical district, and they ban all other types of marijuana establishments. Sandwich did it right. One step at a time. If you're in favor of marijuana sales in Bourne, you should still vote no on number seven. The petitioner aims to get your vote to repeal our ban. He then presents you with a lose-lose proposition in the Zoning Bylaw. If you approve Article 8, marijuana is essentially unrestricted in any

business district.
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you, Mr. Clegg.

MR. ELMER CLEGG: Thank you.
MR. KEVIN HOUGH: Thank you.
Kevin Hough, Shore Road. Four years ago, when we were at Town Meeting discussing the same topic, we were told that the sale of marijuana in Bourne would cause our property values to go down. We were told marijuana causes schizophrenia. We were told the sale of marijuana will lead to dereliction throughout our Town. We were told we had to stop this for our children.

In the four years that have passed, our surrounding communities have allowed cannabis businesses to open in their Towns and have shown all of those things to be untrue.

The opponents of this article know these things are untrue. So, this year, they will tell you something different, which will also be untrue. Our neighboring communities have allowed these businesses to

open, bring jobs to their towns, bring tax money to their towns with no negative repercussions. When businesses open up in towns, their signage and advertising is so regulated that most people don't even know they're there, unless they're specifically looking for them.

In Wareham, there is a commercial building next to Advanced Auto on Cranberry Highway that houses Pizza Boy and a Chinese restaurant. Also in that building is a cannabis manufacturing company that occupies 10,000 square feet employing over 20 employees. Most of you have driven by that building a hundred times and didn't even know it was there. These businesses are so different -- are no different from coffee shops, restaurants, gas stations, liquor stores, doctors' offices, or gyms. If it's not your cup of tea, don't go in.

The opponents will tell you about unlimited cultivation and manufacturing. In the communities on the cape that allow marijuana sales and cultivation, do you know

of any large-scale grows or manufacturing? There are none. Fiscally, it is not a feasible way to do business. Spend millions of dollars on a piece of property in Bourne when you could by the same piece of property for a quarter of the cost 20 miles away offCape.

Tonight, I ask you to vote yes on these articles. It's time we caught up with our neighboring towns.

Thank you.
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you. THE AUDIENCE: (Applause.)

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you.
We're not going to have any applause. Sorry.

Sir, are you in favor or against
this?
MR. DOUGLAS OESTERHELD: Against. MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Okay.

Please go ahead.
MR. DOUGLAS OESTERHELD: Thank
you, Madam Moderator. My name is Doug Oesterheld; I'm from Monument Beach. I

appeal to those of us who act as shepherds for Bourne youth. The CDC reports that the average age a child experiences marijuana is between 11 and 14 years. One in nine of these children will become regular users; one in six people who started using marijuana in their teens will become addicted.

What are the health consequences?
According to the National Institute on Drug Abuse, long-term marijuana use reduces motivation, causes difficulty in concentration, and harms brain development. Forty-five percent of teens reported that the marijuana they used came from a legal pot shop diverted to them by means of a friend, a parent's stash, a black-market resale.

Yes, Massachusetts does prohibit
marijuana sales to persons under 21 and, yes, Massachusetts does prohibit the use of toxic additives. And yet, the leading cause of death for 19- to 43-year-olds is through fentanyl placed into marijuana. A virtual,

undetectable additive to generic marijuana. Black-market sellers use additives like fentanyl to produce a higher high. Two grains of fentanyl powder pressed into a generic marijuana product can be deadly.

For youth, who are naturally adventurous and curious, the presence of pot shops normalizes the use of marijuana. The practical effect is to increase youth access and use and risks. And, meanwhile, blackmarket sellers target these youth to increase their customer base and addictive dependency.

Beyond concerns about societal costs, neighborhood costs, and resource costs, your vote reflects a moral choice. Will you vote to reduce the health and safety risks to Bourne youth? Will you accept responsibility as parents --

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you. Please wrap it up.

MR. DOUGLAS OESTERHELD: -- as grandparents, as friends, as citizens to help shepherd Bourne youth from harms. I

urge you to vote no to keep pot shops out of Bourne.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you. MR. DOUGLAS OESTERHELD: The choice is yours.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you.

Thank you, very much. Are you --
MR. TOM GELSTHORPE: Opposed.
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Anyone in
favor in this line? Anyone in favor over here? You go ahead, sir, in favor.

MR. EDWARD DOW: Hello. My name
is Edward Dow from Buzzards Bay.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you. MR. EDWARD DOW: I grew up in

Bourne. I'm raising my two small, young children in Bourne, going to Bourne schools. My wife is a dance teacher also in this Town. I also can speak as an authority on the cannabis face. I've been involved with cannabis in Massachusetts for about five years, actually close to six now. I was in the first wave of medicinal licenses in Massachusetts from early on. My company is

Solar Cannabis Co., operates throughout the South Coast; Dartmouth, Seekonk, Somerset, and we are also in Rhode Island now, and, hopefully, going to be in Bourne soon.

I approached Bourne a number of years ago about this back when the marijuana craze was real. People were worried about fentanyl, and marijuana was the devil and everything -- or the devil's lettuce and everything else.

I can speak to what some of the earlier speakers talked about with it being an endangerment to our children. I have never seen that in the near six years I've been involved. I haven't seen any community that's been impacted by us negatively. In fact, the Cannabis Control in Massachusetts just definitively said we no longer have to pay what was called, "Host Community Agreements" for our impact. That was an impact we created on the community albeit from the Fire Department, Police Department, any of the municipalities' resources that we strained, we had to pay a nominal fee for or

a substantial fee, which has now been removed from Massachusetts in totality. And that's because they couldn't find any extra fee or drug impact that we imposed on any of the towns that we've been in.

So, I just want to say, quite simply, it's everywhere from the retail perspective. It's not in Bourne. It would be a financial boom for Bourne. It makes a lot of sense in the geographical location we are. I also agree that cultivation would not make any sense in Bourne. Being in a watershed district and the resources on Bourne and the cost down here, it would make no sense. I do operate a facility about 20 miles from here.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you. MR. EDWARD DOW: And I'll conclude with I don't see any negative impact for Bourne, and Cannabis Control is no longer allowing cultivation to expand in Massachusetts. They've currently put a temp on that so.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you,

very much.
MR. EDWARD DOW: All right. Thank
you.

MR. TOM GELSTHORPE: Tom
Gelsthorpe, Cataumet. I've lived in four different towns on Cape Cod over the last 60 years, and I like Bourne the best. I think it's undignified for this nice a Town to promote marijuana sales as a source of tax revenue.

In the long run, I think
municipalities all over the country might regret promoting marijuana sales as much as we regret now promoting tobacco a hundred years ago.

I advise you vote no on number 7 to keep the ban in place.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you. Is there anyone else in favor of this article that would like to be heard? Go ahead, sir.

MR. DAN CHAUVIN: Hi. My name is

Dan Chauvin, 9 Fabyan Way. I've lived in Bourne pretty much my whole natural life. I graduated from Bourne High School in 1982. I married my wife, Karen; met her here in Bourne when I was 12. So we lived in one community on Cape Cod.

My role in all this is $I$ do integrated security. I've provided systems, engineered them, delivered them, implemented them. Prisons, public safety facilities, this school and numerous other facilities including a bunch of marijuana facilities. And with my experience, $I$ can say to you that these facilities are the most secure facilities you'll ever see. You can't get within, you know, 200 yards of them without being identified, or the access in and out is strictly controlled and monitored.

I am for the fiscal aspect of it.
I think it makes sense for this community. I don't think it promotes anything. If you're trying to eliminate somebody putting fentanyl in a drug, $I$ would argue you should

control it. I think that's the safest thing for our community.

I coach football, Pop Warner, for 12 years, and $I$ work with a lot of young youths, young people, and $I$ think it's a good thing for them to make sure that, A., they don't get involved with it, and if they did, at least we'd know about it, and that's really what $I$ have to say.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you.
So we've heard from eight voters so far.
I'm asking everyone to make sure that they're adding new information and facts to the debate as we move forward. So, go ahead, Mr. Mealy. I recognize you. MR. STEPHEN MEALY: Thank you, Madam Moderator. Stephen Mealy from Sagamore Beach, former member and chairman of the Bourne Planning Board and Select Board.

On July 28, 2022, the state's Supreme Judicial Court upheld a Barnstable Superior Court ruling that the Town of

Bourne Bylaw that was passed in 2018 's Special Town Meeting in Bourne prohibiting non-medical marijuana sale was valid. The July 28th decision was the first in the state that sided with the Town for a nonmedical marijuana ban.

The discussion has been going on for eight years since 2016 when the Town of Bourne voted against the legalization of recreational cannabis in Massachusetts when it was first put to voters in a statewide ballot. At each juncture, the Town has won legal challenges of being able to ban marijuana sales, and the amount of legal costs have been approved by the Select Board every time, every year. The Town has invested tens of thousands of dollars following the directions of the Select Board and the vote of this Town Meeting to protect our Bylaw. Bourne is one of the few towns having a Bylaw with an outright ban on all pot sales, distribution, and cultivation in the Commonwealth.

After years of supporting

unanimous votes, the Bourne Selectmen, I think we should continue to defend our Bylaw. Why are we here this evening? It's one word; it's money. The argument is we're not collecting tax dollars from pot sales. The Town will not financially benefit from the money collected from pot sales. It will not be used to lower taxes. The financial benefits being suggested tonight are not guaranteed, nor do they reflect what is happening within the industry today. We will incur other offsetting costs for public safety, additional school personnel to address increased marijuana availability to be used by our children, and Health Department, and administrative costs.

The benefit of allowing marijuana sales in Bourne is one of the owners of the shops and not the taxpayers of Bourne. They have shops in other towns, and Bourne has been continuously been denying them. Let us continue to deny them this evening. I ask --

MR. JARED DARDANO: Hi, folks. Jared Dardano; I live in Pocasset. I'm not a strong public speaker, so forget the --

MR. JARED DARDANO: Yep. Whether you're against this or for it, I want to be realistic about what happens after this vote. Whether this motion passes or fails, the same amount of people are going to use pretty much the same amount of marijuana in

pretty much the same locations that they intended to do it.

Cannabis is legal in the state.
There are plenty of dispensaries around nearby. You're not going to change that either way depending on how you vote. This is solely about affording small businesses the opportunity to open in the Town and collect some extra tax revenue. It's not a moral vote. It's not a health vote. It's a pragmatic decision of letting some stores open. That's it. That's all we're doing. It will be fine. We're wasting energy thinking about this; we're wasting literal resources according to the last speaker on enforcing this prohibition.

So, thank you.
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you. Please go ahead.

MR. THOMAS SPENCE: Thomas Spence,
Monument Beach. What we have before us tonight is a question and one, really, the main question. And what are we teaching our children about power and money? This Town

voted and has spent a lot of money to maintain the ban on marijuana sales.

Now that we're going to come -well, we need the money; we need the money. That isn't a good thing to teach young people or any person. If it was right then for those reasons, then it's right now. Thank you.

All right. We've heard from 11 voters now; six against, five in favor. Are you in favor?

MS. CATHERINE WALTON: I, actually, have a clarifying question. I'm not for or against.

serious. (Laughter.) That's funny. That was just whether or not we were going to stop debating. So, we do have -- this was a citizen's petition, so we do have some

people who still need to talk on the stage. Does the Finance Committee have a recommendation on Article 7? MS. AMANDA BONGIOVANNI: We do, Madam Moderator. By taking no action, the committee shows that neither supports nor opposes allowing marijuana dispensaries in Town, thus, putting the deciding power onto the voters at Town Meeting.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you. Does the Select Board have a recommendation to make on this article?

MR. JARED MACDONALD: The Select Board voted unanimously to take no position. MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you, Mr. MacDonald. All right.

SELECT BOARD JARED MACDONALD: It's up to the voters. MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: So, debate is over. I'm going to ask everyone to just

Does the Select Board have a positive motion on this article? SELECTPERSON MARY JANE MASTRANGELO: No.

MS. MARY MASTRANGELO: So, are you going to ask if there's a positive motion from the floor? You want me to explain first? So, the position of the Board of Selectmen was that if Article 7, the repeal of the ban, did not pass, the Board of Selectmen recommends that we vote to indefinitely postpone this article, which is not a positive motion so.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you.

Does anyone have a positive motion to make on Article 8? Seeing none. I would entertain your motion.

MS. MARY MASTRANGELO: We move the Town vote to indefinitely postpone this

MR. STEPHEN MEALY: Second.
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: I have a second. You have the floor.

MS. MARY MASTRANGELO: Okay.
Thank you. Since Article 7 has failed, and the general Bylaw ban on nonmedical
marijuana establishments remains in place, the Select Board recommends that Article 8 be indefinitely postponed.

With the General Bylaw ban in place, zoning regulations are not necessary as nonmedical Marijuana Establishments are not allowed to locate within the Town.

A "Yes" vote in favor of the motion to indefinitely postpone the article would maintain the status quo and the zoning Bylaw would not be amended.

A "No" vote opposed to the motion to indefinitely postpone would require another motion to be made on Article 8 to discuss and vote on the proposed private petition amendment to the zoning Bylaw.

The Select Board voted unanimously

5 to 0 to recommend indefinite postponement of this article if the motion on Article 7 failed, and the ban on nonmedical marijuana establishments remains in place.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you.

MS. AMANDA BONGIOVANNI: We do.
It is also not a positive motion.
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Okay.
Please give your recommendation.
MS. AMANDA BONGIOVANNI: The
Finance Committee voted 8-0-0 to recommend indefinite postponement of this article. MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you. Is there any further discussion on Article 8? Seeing none, we will move to a vote on Article --

THE AUDIENCE: We've got one. MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Please approach the podium if you'd like to speak. MALE VOICE: I guess I'm a novice to these proceedings. I'm not quite sure what an indefinite postponement means for

the article that was before us. Does it mean that it can be brought up at any time without further discussion, or does it mean it is sort of at the will of the select Board to bring it up when they want? MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: So the Select Board didn't bring this article up. It was a citizen's petition, and indefinite postponement means that we're not going to be voting on Article 8 tonight.

MALE VOICE: Then will it be brought up again as a citizen petition? MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: I can't say. I'm not a citizen that would bring it forward, but any citizen in Bourne can bring it forward at any time, yes. We voted on this before at this meeting. MALE VOICE: Okay. Then I recommend against this proposal so that we can actually vote on Article 8.

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Okay.
Thank you. We're going to move ahead now to a vote on Article 8, which is the Select Board's motion is indefinite postponement.

(Article 8 passed.)

The Bourne Historical Society has expressed interest in ownership of the structure and filed a Community Preservation application to refund relocation of the structure.

The preferred relocation parcel is owned by the Historical Society at Aptucxet; however, if that parcel is not viable for the permanent placement of the structure,

The requested amount of up to $\$ 250,000$ is based on estimates on similar projects. There are costs that can't be determined until Town Meeting approves the funding, and the funding is secured, and the move is completed.

A "Yes" vote in favor of the motion would allow CPA funds to be used for the cost associated with relocating the Keene house which was built in 1690 from privately-owned land at 9 Sandwich Road to property currently owned or to be owned in the future by the Bourne Historical Society, Inc., and the preservation of this historic

A "Yes" or "Aye" vote in favor of the motion will allow the Town to begin putting the Opioid Settlement Funds to use by creating programs for prevention and to assist those struggling with substance abuse addictions.

A "No" or "Nay" vote opposed to the motion would not transfer the settlement funds out of Free Cash, and the Town would not be able to create the necessary programs.

the ESCO. We did not want to roll it into the ESCO program because the energyefficiency cost savings of that unit would not really benefit the ESCO project. We had already incorporated into the Town capital plan so we kept within that method. The ESCO will be -- we'll have control over that unit. The Town's just going to be installing it separately of that project.

MR. WILLIAM DOHERTY: Okay. So if
I understand you --
MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: It's not a back-and-forth. If you need to clarify, you can, but he gave you his answer. Okay. So if you want to follow-up, go ahead, but -MR. WILLIAM DOHERTY: The followup is that since we do have this contract, and from what $I$ understand, the contract is self-policing, I'm very concerned that we have what I'd call accountability with regard to the things that are part of it. So since items are being added, and I'm hearing they're not part of that

original contract, I have some concern about how transparent, you know, the effect of all of this energy conservation, energy selection is --

your question specifically on this article though?

MR. WILLIAM DOHERTY: The specific question I have on the article is that if you're putting in a heating and ventilating air conditioning unit, and we have a consultant that is responsible for managing our energy savings, how much savings in terms of selection have come under the, let's say, the selection process by the energy consultant?

MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Okay. ADMINISTRATOR MARLENE MCCOLLEM:

So, this particular piece of equipment, this air handler for $\$ 40,000$, is not part of the ESCO. It's being installed outside of that contract. So any of those energy calculations are not included in TRANE's ESCO calculations. We're doing this one as

a standalone project.

MR. STEPHEN MEALY: If we grant the Conservation Commission the authority to grant a waiver, we're basically allowing them to then determine which Bylaw rules and regulations they're going to enforce for a particular applicant and which they're not. How are we to, as a Town, be able to enforce

-- not to enforce -- but to allow such waivers to be granted from a commission, which is appointed, not elected? How is it that we are going to hand over the keys to a project to either go forward or not to the very people that are supposed to be reviewing the project for the regulations to protect our wetlands?

MS. STEPHANIE FITCH: Let me kind of back up here for a second. So, the waiver that the Commission is presenting here, the performance standards are always going to be as strict if not stricter than the state Wetlands Protection Act. So, remember, this is just for the local Bylaw, right? So we're already more protective.

There's going to be a long list, I believe you can see in the Voter Handbook, you know, you need a brief statement; you need mitigation; you need different ways to minimize impact. So, really, this waiver is to allow the Commission to work with applicants to come up with creative solutions that will

enhance other resource areas through mitigation instead of just strictly denying a project under the local Bylaw and then allowing it to go just to the state level for a superseding order of conditions. So, I see this as almost a more protective option for Bourne's local wetland resources. MR. STEVE MEALY: Thank you, very much. Thank you, Madam Moderator. MODERATOR AMY KULLAR: Thank you, Mr. Mealy. Go ahead, Mr. York.

MR. JOHN YORK: John York. Again, Steve, you might not want to sit down too fast; she might need to answer this. I'm curious about the motivation for this, and I suspect the motivation may have something to do with deflecting potential litigation against the Town, and, so, could someone speak to that?

MS. STEPHANIE FITCH: Yes. Again, Stephanie Fitch, Conservation Agent. So, yes, as I kind of said previously, this is a way to allow the Commission to work with an applicant to come up with more creative

solutions because, like I said, if a project necessarily can't meet a performance standard, they strictly just have to deny, and then they have the option to go appeal the denial and go to the state for a superseding order of condition, which I said is less, typically, less protective than the local Bylaw. Just because an applicant asks for a waiver does not mean the Commission has to grant it. So the Commission has to see that the waiver offers mitigation that will enhance the wetland resources in a special way that will make the project unique instead of just denying; does that make sense? It has to be worthwhile.

MR. JOHN YORK: Okay. I'm not sure I got exactly the answer I was looking for. But I would just observe that -- I'm afraid that allowing the option of a waiver will actually encourage more litigation against the Town because someone's who's interested in getting their way and has a lot of money to spend on lawyers, it doesn't matter what we put up in front of them, they

will sue us. And when you start granting waivers, they will sue you for you didn't grant them a waiver, and that $I$ think is problematic no matter what you put in for requirements to meet a waiver, you're just adding more playing pieces to their playing table that their lawyers are going to play with.

And even though $I$, personally, would benefit probably significantly from this waiver option and probably would benefit from it within the next five years, I would recommend voting against it for the reason that $I$ just stated. Thank you.

What will happen is that the Department of Developmental Disabilities will take the people that are most vulnerable, most in need, and they will put them in. We could actually -- the Town of Bourne could have three people in it, or they could have none.

But it's the way we are doing things now to try and do regional housing. As the Town of Bourne, we can't try as affordable housing to provide housing for every group. But by doing it regionally, we can help them so much.

Now, in Phase 1, which was done and opened up in 2020, Dennis, Barnstable, Yarmouth, Brewster, Chatham, and Mashpee, contributed. Now this is Phase 2: Dennis,

Barnstable, Yarmouth, and tonight Brewster and Sandwich at their town meetings approved money, and we are on board to, hopefully, approve it.

They plan now to go to Mashpee and Chatham again, and to Falmouth, Harwich, and Orleans so that all the towns will get together and do this regionally for a very vulnerable population that sorely needs housing, and we should, hopefully, approve this message as an important step forward for us. I served on the Housing Authority in Harwich for 25 years, and the idea of regional housing is something that we need to support because there's more opportunity to get affordable housing if it's on a regional basis, especially for the population that they're trying to help.
