Attached is a diagram that shows the location for the paid parking to take place.



AMENDMENT TO LEASE AGREEMENT

This Amendment (the "Amendment") is entered into as of the 13 day of July, 2021 by and between the Town of Bourne, a municipality organized under the laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, with an address of 24 Perry Avenue, Buzzards Bay, Massachusetts 02532 (the "Town") and the National Marine Life Center, Inc., a tax-exempt non-profit corporation organized under the laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts with an address of 120 Main Street, Buzzards Bay, Massachusetts 02532 (the "NMLC").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Town of Bourne and NMLC are parties to a Lease Agreement between the Town of Bourne and the National Marine Life Center, Inc. dated March 25, 2003 (the "Lease"); and

WHERAS, the Town of Bourne and NMLC desire to amend the Lease as further described herein;

WHEREAS, on May 6, 2019, the Bourne Town Meeting approved an article to "authorize the Board of Selectmen to amend the Lease between the Town of Bourne and the National Marine Life Center on terms and conditions deemed to be in the best interests of the Town by the Board of Selectmen ...";

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing, of the mutual promises and obligations set forth herein, and for other good and valuable consideration the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, the parties hereby agree as follows:

Section XI of the Lease is amended by adding the following as a second paragraph:

Notwithstanding the forgoing, Lessor agrees that Lessee may sublet the parcel shown as Parcel 2 as shown on Exhibit B to the Lease for parking for the period of time commencing on August 28, 2021 and ending on August 27, 2024. Lessee agrees the public may use the parcels shown as Parcels 179 and 180 on Exhibit B ("the Front Lot") to the Lease for parking subject to the following conditions:

(a) the Lessee may designate up to 20 spaces in the Front Lot for the Lessee's exclusive use during regular business hours (8am to 6pm) and may have exclusive use of all spaces in the Front Lot during

- Lessee's events. The Building Inspector shall determine how many of the parking spaces are required by law to be handicap accessible;
- (b) The National Marine Life Center will assume the cost and effectuate the restriping and signage of the lot for public parking and provide handicapped spaces as approved by the Inspector of Buildings;
- (c) there shall be no overnight parking by the public on any of the spaces in the Front Lot;
- (d) In the event of any future expansion of the Lessee's facilities, Lessee shall have the right to designate all spaces in the Front Lot for the exclusive use of the Lessee.

In all other respects, the terms of the Lease are ratified.







IRP AND MMRP SOURCE AREA SITES AND IRP GROUNDWATER PLUMES





Largest Historical Compared to Current Plume Size








Landfill-1 Cleanup Progression








Tanker Truck Rollover Sites PFAS



Active Bourne Sites

- **Demolition Area 1** formerly used for demolition training and disposal of munitions.
 - 3.4 billion gallons of groundwater treated since 2004. Treatment systems are on-base, at the base boundary to stop contamination from migrating off-base and an off-base extraction addresses contamination that has migrated past the base boundary.
 - The historic maximum of RDX and perchlorate was 370 parts per billion (ppb) and 500 ppb, respectively; current maximums are 1.5 ppb and 22.5 ppb. The maximum perchlorate off-base is 2.73 ppb.
- ♦ The Central Impact Area (CIA) used as the primary target area for artillery and mortar firing from the 1930s through 1997.
 - RDX and Perchlorate plumes migrate northwest towards Cape Cod Canal. A pump and treat system consisting of three extraction wells is used to contain groundwater with concentrations of RDX greater than 2 ppb at Burgoyne Road.
 - A Long Term Source Area Response in underway to address munitions items and related soil contamination located throughout the CIA. To date, over 90 acres have been cleared to 90% in the CIA. Four tons of explosives have been removed and safely destroyed and over 700 tons of munitions-related scrap have been recycled.



Closed Bourne Sites

- The **Northwest Corner**, where groundwater contamination was located in northwestern portion of the installation migrating off-base towards the Canal and the **Western Boundary** of Camp Edwards where low levels of contamination were identified in 2002 have already attenuated below risk-based levels.
 - Monitored Natural Attenuation and Land-use Controls (LUCs) were used to address these areas of groundwater contamination Under this remedy, the low levels of contamination in these plumes were reduced through natural processes.
 - The source areas for these plumes had already been depleted or removed, so there is no continuing source of contamination. The Western Boundary site has been closed and the closure process has started for the Northwest Corner, as the site appears to have reached cleanup goals.
 - Groundwater monitoring continues in the areas of all IAGWSP plumes to verify that the plumes are attenuating/cleaning up according to predictions. The LUCs are monitored to prevent exposure to groundwater contamination above risk-based levels and include verifying that homes in the area of groundwater plumes are on town water and ensuring that no new water supply wells are drilled in the areas of the plumes. The LUC program also identifies any evaluates any existing private wells.

DEFINITIONS

<u>Combined city and highway MPG (EPA Combined fuel economy)</u>: Combined Fuel Economy equals the fuel economy from driving a combination of 43% city and 57% highway miles and is calculated as follows:

=1/[(0.43/city MPG)+(0.57/highway MPG)]

<u>Drive System</u>: The manner in which mechanical power is directly transmitted from the drive shaft to the wheels. The following codes are used in the drive field:

- AWD = All Wheel Drive: 4 -wheel drive automatically controlled by the vehicle power train system
- 4WD = 4-Wheel Drive: driver selectable 4-wheel drive with 2-wheel drive option
- 2WD = 2-Wheel Drive

<u>Heavy-duty vehicle</u>: Vehicles with a manufacturer's gross vehicle weight rating (GVWR) of more than 8,500 pounds.

POLICY STATEMENT

In an effort to reduce the Town of Bourne fuel consumption and energy costs the Town of Bourne hereby adopts a policy to purchase only fuel efficient vehicles to meet this goal.

PURPOSE

To establish a requirement that the Town of Bourne purchase only fuel efficient vehicles for municipal use whenever such vehicles are commercially available and practicable.

APPLICABILITY

This policy applies to all divisions and departments of the Town of Bourne. It applies to road-worthy passenger vehicles, pick up and utility trucks, and SUVs. It does not apply to specialized equipment or off-road vehicles.

GUIDELINES

All departments/divisions shall purchase only fuel efficient vehicles for municipal use whenever such vehicles are commercially available and practicable.

The Town of Bourne will maintain an annual vehicle inventory for ALL vehicles and a plan for replacing any non-exempt vehicles with vehicles that meet, at a minimum, the fuel efficiency ratings contained in the most recent guidance for Criterion 4 published by the MA Department of Energy Resources' Green Communities Division.

It is the responsibility of the Town of Bourne to check the Green Communities Division's Guidance for Criterion 4 for updates prior to ordering replacement vehicles.

Exemptions

- Heavy-duty vehicles: examples include fire-trucks, ambulances, and some public works trucks that meet the definition of heavy-duty vehicle.
- As of the adoption date (above) police cruisers are exempt from this criterion due to lack of widespread availability. However, we commit to purchasing fuel efficient police cruisers, when they become commercially available. Police and fire department administrative vehicles are NOT exempt and must meet fuel efficient requirements.

The following information shall be included in a vehicle inventory list and said list shall be updated on an annual basis and provided to the Green Communities Division:

FUEL EFFICIENT VEHICLE REPLACEMENT PLAN

All non-exempt vehicles shall be replaced with fuel efficient vehicles that adhere to the most recent Green Communities Criterion 4 Guidance. Vehicles shall be replaced when they are no longer operable and will not be recycled from one municipal department to another unless the recycled replacement is more efficient than the vehicle it is replacing. In addition, when replacing exempt vehicles, the function of the vehicle will be reviewed for potential replacement with a more fuel efficient vehicle, including a fuel efficient non-exempt vehicle. Town of Bourne will review on an annual basis the Vehicle Inventory, along with the Green Communities Criterion 4 Guidance, to plan for new acquisitions as part of planning for the new fiscal year budget.



SECTION 1.0 - Overview

- **1.1 Purpose:** The purpose of this Strategic Plan is to codify and express the organizational process which will define the Town's direction toward a future state as defined by the Vision Statement. It will serve as a guide to make informed decisions regarding the allocation of resources to pursue that future state and ensure that we are successful by focusing on identified focus areas and accomplishing a variety of Strategic Goals and the Initiatives associated with each.
- **1.2 Scope:** Although this plan will serve as a primary guide for the Board, Town Administrator and Staff, it is important that there is synchronization throughout and between various other important plans, documents and policies. These should include, at a minimum, the following:
 - The Local Comprehensive Plan
 - Open Space and Recreation Plan
 - Housing Production Plan
 - Comprehensive Wastewater Management Plan
 - Capital Improvement Plan
 - Five Year Financial Plan
 - Financial Policies
 - Annual Operating and Enterprise Budgets

Keeping these plans in the forefront when developing lower-level parts of this plan, e.g., initiatives, will assist in avoiding divergent paths when addressing important issues facing the town, now or in the future.

- **1.3 Desired Outcome:** In addition to the broad purpose statements above, this Strategic Plan also serves to accomplish other important outcomes, such as:
 - Helping to build consensus and stakeholder engagement
 - Clarifying priorities to provide focus and clarity
 - Establishing accountability across town government
 - Providing a framework for analysis when considering our Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats (SWOT)
 - Creates a system for evaluating and gauging progress
- **1.4 Structure:** The structure used in developing this plan is one that starts out broadly with the Vision and then becomes more refined and defined with each succeeding step in the process. 

In accordance with Chapter 130, Section 74A of the Massachusetts General Laws, the Division of Marine Fisheries has determined that the below defined "CONDITIONALLY APPROVED" shellfishing growing area, Mashnee Road (BB:46.3), in the Town of Bourne, no longer meets the established criteria for the harvest of shellfish due to seasonal water quality changes and NSSP Mooring Area criteria. The status of this area will be changed to "CLOSED TO SHELLFISHING" as of sunrise on August 1, 2021.

Therefore, under authority of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 130, Section 74A, the status of the below defined area has been changed to "CLOSED TO SHELLFISHING" to the taking of shellfish. Digging, harvesting or collecting and/or attempting to dig, harvest or collect shellfish and the possession of shellfish from the below defined area is prohibited.

The Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (MassDEP) has reviewed the document "Draft Engineering Evaluation and Cost Analysis, Non-Time Critical Removal Action, Replace Residential Drinking Water Wells with Municipal Water, Tanker Truck Rollover Sites" (the EE/CA) dated July 2021. The United States Air Force (USAF) proposes to conduct a non-time critical removal action (NTCRA) to address per- and polyfluorinated alkyl substances (PFAS) contamination in only four of eight residential drinking water wells impacted by Tanker Truck Rollover Sites (TTRS) at Joint Base Cape Cod (JBCC). MassDEP offers the following comments on the EE/CA.

General Comment:

1. The Remedial Action Objective of the EE/CA is proposed to eliminate the imminent and substantial danger to human health posed by PFOS/PFOA-contaminated groundwater from only 4 residential drinking water wells impacted by the TTRS. Alternative 3 in the EE/CA proposes a municipal water connection for 4 residences impacted by PFOS/PFOA to municipal water through a new water supply piping system connected to the Bourne Water District distribution system. However, Alternative 3 does not include a provision for bottled water or a water filtration system and does not include residential monitoring, long-term O&M of water filtration systems for a resident who may refuse a connection to the Bourne Water District distribution system. In this case, Alternative 3 does not eliminate or mitigate the imminent and substantial danger to human health posed by PFOS/PFOA-contaminated groundwater to residents.

In addition, there is no alternative included in the EE/CA for the provision for a connection of all eight residences which have water supply wells impacted by PFAS, specifically residences which are impacted by PFAS6 compounds over the Massachusetts Maximum Contaminant Level (MMCL).
